INDIANS MUST CONSENT.

Important Decision Relating to Uintah Reservation Lands.

Washington, Sept. 26 .- The acting secretary of the interior today decided that the assent of the Indians on the Uintah reservation in Utah to the tak-ing of all allotments, etc., as proposed in the last Indian appropriation act, h a prerequisite to the right of the Ray. Mining company, with headquarters in Chicago, to locate the mining claims specifically allowed them under the act in lieu of the lease the company has or lands there. He holds that the location of the claims will be operative only in the event that the Indians assent to the taking of allotments. The government of Russia is not inclined to insist on the performof the Berlin treaty. It is pointed out that even if the powers acuqlesced in Secy. Hay's proposal, Roumania could always claim that her anti-Semitlegislation was non-religious and purely economic

Refused to Close Schools.

Nantes, France, Sept. 25 .-- Commandant Leroy Daduric of the Nineteenth infantry, who on August 18, was placed under arrest for refusing to obey an order to ald in closing unauthorized schools, has been tried by court martial and dismissed from the service. Laduric admitted the charge of disobedience, but declared that his con science forbade him to participate in evictin anti-religious measures, and vomen which he did not consider to be duties of the army.
