

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

TERMS OF TIME.—Articles for the Evening Mail will leave at 5 p.m. The change is made in order to connect with the Railroad.

THEATRICAL.—There will be a great change this evening at the Theatre. The scene is changed from fairy land to the dark forests of Normandy, where a large band of robbers once dwelt, who became the terror of the peasantry. "The Idiot of the Mill" is one of those vivid intensely exciting dramas, in the construction of which the French authors are so clever. The fierce combat in the second act, between the millers, villagers and robbers is one of the most terrible scenes ever represented on the mimic stage. The finale of the third act also forms the picture of a startling denouement. The director of superintendence, Mr. Nathan succeeded, only with great difficulty, in obtaining the required number of robbers for the piece, several of the old robbers having left for the Railroad.

Madame Scheller plays "Lendormie the Idiot," (singing several songs) and the entire company is engaged in the piece.

FLOWERS.—We had a beautiful pyramidal bouquet of flowers presented to us this morning by Bro. Theodore Smith, a compositor on this paper. It was composed of about fifty varieties of large double pinks and peonies, raised from the seed in his and Mrs. Hemenway's garden, and crowned with White Tuft, all most beautiful and fragrant.

THE EXORCISER.—Bro. John Brown, writing from Omaha on the 15th instant says: "To-morrow I expect to start a small party of Saints from here." This was the first party started from that point for the Plains. On the 17th, he expected Bro. Stuart with about fifty more, who would be immediately forwarded with the Express Train. Bro. H. B. Clawson telegraphed Bro. Brown on the 14th, that 500 of the Saints were on route from New York to Omaha, and that 700 more would start on the 15th. They were expected at Omaha almost by the time the small companies referred to above had got fairly started, and would be forwarded to the terminus by special train.

FEARFUL RITES.—The editor of the Virginia Tresspass says he has been thinking of joining the Good Templars Temperance Organization, but having heard of the initiatory process, his courage failed and he declines the honor of becoming a good templar. He gives the following as the programme of the initiation rites: "The victim for initiation is first blindfolded, bound hand and foot, and then thrown into a cold press and squeezed for five or ten minutes. This is done for the purpose of clearing his system of all evil influences. He is then taken out of the cold press, and by means of a force pump, gorged with claret wine, after which sealing plaster is put over his mouth and he is thrown into a barrel four or five times across the room, the cheer at the same time ringing the cold water song. He is then taken out of the barrel and hung up by the heels until the whole body is out through his ears; then he is cut down, and a beautiful lady hands him a glass of ice water. A cold water bath is then administered, which he is showered with claret wine. He is then made to read aloud the articles of incorporation and by-laws of the Water Company, ten times, drinking a glass of claret wine between each reading; after which "The Old Oak on Buck's" is read and hung around his neck, while fifteen sisters with squirt-guns deluge him with claret wine. He is then forced to drink two pounds of ice cream, while the brothers fill his ears full of powdered ice. Then he is taken through a patent clothes-wringer, after which he is handed a glass of water and his boots are filled with the same and he is laid away in a refrigerator. After remaining in the refrigerator half an hour he is taken out, run through a clothes-wringer, takes the whole Lodge down to Morrill's soda fountain, stands there, and becomes a Good Templar."

FATAL RAILROAD ACCIDENT.—The Cheyenne Leader of the 15th inst. contains an account of a railroad accident, which caused the death of an ex-policeman named Clark, and the serious bodily injury of Sheriff J. L. Laird. As the train which left Cheyenne at two o'clock on the 14th was descending the grade on the west side of the mountain, a train of platform cars loaded with stone and boulders was sidled on a side track to allow the freight train to pass. As soon as it passed the switch the stone train started towards the city. After it reached the main track the coupling of the last car gave way, allowing it to run back so rapidly as to strike the freight train and run into the engine. Sheriff Laird and ex-policeman Clark were in the engine. Clark died of his injuries the following morning; but Sheriff Laird, who had the jaws on both sides of his face completely crushed in, was likely to recover.

LIVELY.—The Leader of the 15th contains a letter purporting to have been written at Green River, by a gentleman, to his partner in Cheyenne. It contains an account of the lively condition of the times at the New City. (Green River). The "strikers" from Carmichael's Camp, after having been paid off, encamped on McDermott's Island, and threatened to take the town. Only one grader was shot. The day after the arrival of the "strikers" the town's people mustered their forces and took their quarters in a house, where they remained till the following day, when the excitement cooled down. Since then, things had remained quiet.

COAL FROM UTAH.—The Deseret Herald of the 15th inst. says: "This morning a teamer brought into the city three tons of coal from a kanyon about thirty miles from Salt Lake City, which was sold at 64 cents a bushel. The coal is of the bituminous variety, and is excellent for the manufacture of gas."

"A BURNING WIND."—By letter from Brother Charles Lambert, dated Mountain Green, July 15th, we are informed that there was a few "hoppers" in that region at that date. He says, "This afternoon the ground is covered with locusts, the air seems full of them as far as the eye can penetrate, and the noise is like a rushing wind or running waters."
