

UTAH HAS BEEN GROSSLY SLANDERED

Senator Smoot Emphatically Denies That "Mormons" Tried To Monopolize President.

MEETING IN TABERNACLE.

Hour Changed and Was Satisfactory To Representative of the Ministers' Association.

Washington, Nov. 3.—Echoes of the trip of President Taft through Utah were heard in Washington today, when Senator Smoot, who has just returned from the presidential trip down the Mississippi river, declared sensational publications in regard to the trip had been sent out for political effect. According to the senator, the Mormons did not try to monopolize the president and the accounts to that effect were a gross slander on the state.

committee on arrangements for the president's visit," explained the senator. "A committee of 25 was chosen, of which 17 were non-Mormons and eight were Mormons. The original program provided for a public gathering in the tabernacle on Sunday, Sept. 26.

"Rev. Mr. Short, representing the Ministers' Association, telephoned to me complaining that the hour fixed for the meeting would interfere with regular church services and asking that the time be changed. The committee changed the time to 10:30, which Mr. Short said would be satisfactory. This program was carried out, the presi-

dent speaking to 12,000 people in the tabernacle.

"A committee of eight to go in a private car, to meet the president at Helper, near the Colorado line, was appointed, and of these five were non-Mormons and three were Mormons. The chairman in charge, by which I introduced the president at the tabernacle, instead of Mayor Bransford, was made with the full agreement of all concerned, and because the mayor stated he was not feeling well.

"The statement that Gov. Spry and myself refused to enter the Utah church with the president is a wicked falsehood. In fact, a glance at the governor sitting on President Taft's right. The chief justice of the supreme court sat on the left, with Mayor Bransford and myself in line.

"In short, the sensational reports of embarrassing situations and charging an attempt by Mormons to monopolize the president had not the slightest foundation in fact. A glance at the president's engagements while in Utah and an analysis of the membership of the committee which had charge of his completely disproves these statements. Utah has been grossly slandered in this connection."

CIRCUS ON TOP OF TEN-STORY BUILDING

New York, Nov. 4.—A circus 10 stories up in the air, on the roof of the Hotel Astor, has been arranged for entertainment of the military jobbers, from all of the big cities of the country, who are here for their annual convention. A tent has been erected on the roof, and the circus animals have been hoisted up by derrick, a sawdust ring laid out, several midway shows set up, and other features of the old-fashioned country circus provided. The show will be on tonight and tomorrow night, but will not be open to the public.

WOMAN'S ABILITY TO DO MAN'S WORK

Chicago, Nov. 4.—To assume the task of running a street railway system, acting as its president, manager, collector and "utility man," when her husband's death left the road in her hands, is what was done by Mrs. Carrie Bahrenburg of Belvidere, Ill. Mrs. Bahrenburg told her experience as a captain of industry yesterday afternoon before the Chicago Woman's club, her address concluding a short series on "Woman's ability to do man's work."

"My former husband barely had started the road in Delhi, a suburb of St. Louis," she said, "when his death forced me to take up the work. For five years I managed every detail, leading in the work of clearing away snow blockades early in the winter mornings."

SOCIALIST VOTE IN GREATER NEW YORK

New York, Nov. 4.—Complete election returns show that the Socialist vote throughout the city was considerably less than half of last year, when Eugene Debs ran for president. This city gave Debs a vote of 25,000. The total Socialist vote this year was 10,000.

FIGHT FOR A FORTUNE.

New York, Nov. 4.—Scott Calhoun, corporation counsel of Seattle, is here to take depositions in the suit brought by the heirs of James Osborne. When a boy, Osborne ran away from his home in this city, and later settled in Seattle when it was a struggling little town.

When he died, he left 10 to 15 to the city with the stipulation that a town hall was to be erected on them when Seattle raised sufficient money. The property has since increased in value until it is now assessed at \$25,000 and a number of persons have filed claims to it as heirs to Osborne.

MITCHELL SAYS CASE WILL GO TO SUPREME COURT

Chicago, Nov. 4.—John Mitchell, vice president of the American Federation of Labor, whose sentence of nine months' imprisonment for contempt of a federal court has been upheld by the United States court of appeals, has arrived here too late to meet President Samuel Gompers before the latter went to Washington, but Mr. Mitchell declared that the matter would be taken to the supreme court, and that he was willing to go to jail in defense of a principle. If the final court sustained the other.

"The matter will undoubtedly be taken up by the convention of the American Federation of Labor, which begins in Toronto on Tuesday," he declared.

"Trial by jury is the traditional and constitutional right of a free people. The agitation against the decision will be of national scope and will be kept up. Meantime every legal course will be tried to have the sentence set aside."

STRANGE REASON FOR POSTPONING EXECUTION

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 4.—In order that she may procure the money to defray the burial expenses, a sister of Judge Elliott, under sentence to be hanged tomorrow for murder, has addressed a letter to Gov. Brown asking that execution be postponed for 10 days.

In the letter Miss Elliott explains that her mother will receive her pension check Nov. 15, and that they wish to take the body to Chattanooga for burial.

BLACK HAND MYSTERY SOLVED BY CONFESSION

Ottumwa, Ia., Nov. 4.—A "Black Hand" mystery, which has puzzled the officials of Keokuk county for a long time, was unraveled here yesterday when Charles Hix of Hedrick, made a confession to the sheriff that he himself had written threatening letters to the firm of Hix Bros., of which he is a member. The letters were addressed to James Reynolds, a clerk in the store, and demanded money.

Hix was arrested by the sheriff, but was released after he had made the confession. He said he could give no reason for writing the letters.

The first letter was written to Reynolds, and ordered him to leave the community under threat. It was signed "Black Hand." Reynolds stayed, however, and a few days later received another letter written in the same hand. The threats were a little stronger.
