"A feature of the government irrigation projects that is not likely to be discussed at the meeting of the irrigation congress at El Paso, is the attempt of interested politicians to gain control of the distribution of the increasing fund for reclamation work.

The above was shown to Attorney Richards and State Engineer Doremus, and both stated that the distribution of the moneys was entirely within the jurisdiction of the secretary of the interior, and that it was only on his behalf that it could be apportioned out.

PRINCIPALS' SALARIES.

Resolution Offered at Meeting of the Board of Education.

The long continued attempt of the board of education to agree on a method of raising the salaries of the principals in the city schools, came up for further action at a special meeting of the board of education last night.

Motionist Thomas submitted the following resolution to replace those which have been unfavorably discussed heretofore.

"That the salaries of high school principals shall be determined on individual merit, but that no salary shall be less than the maximum salary paid a high school principal in the city school system. A high school principal shall, however, be the holder of a state high school diploma, or its equivalent.

The financial report of the treasurer of the board showed an overdraft of \$102,106.70.
