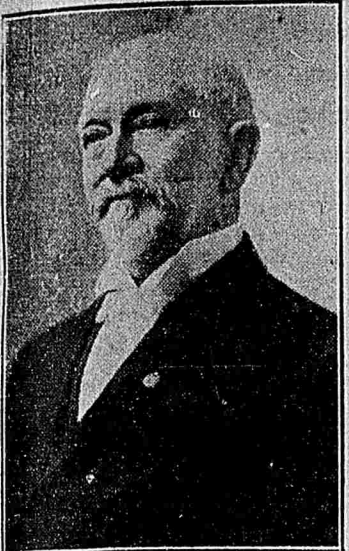
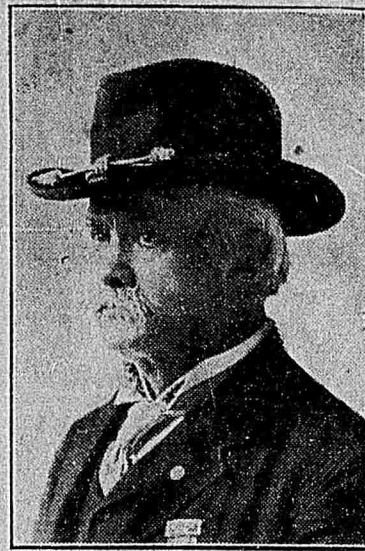




G. A. R. Veterans of Salt Lake

Rudolph Alf, who passed through one of the fiercest campaigns of the war, enlisted in company B, Fourth regiment New York volunteer cavalry on June 30, 1864, and remained with the company until the close of the war. He was mustered out at New York on July 17, 1865. With him to this day he carries two scars which he received in battle. He was first wounded at Frank Royal, Va., on Sept. 19, 1864, by an exploding shell, which disabled him for some time. In a skirmish a few days after he had left the hospital he was wounded again. This time he was shot through the right wrist when he leaped from his horse and attempted to pick up the flag which had fallen from the hands of a wounded comrade. He was engaged in the battles at Wilderness, Cold Harbor, Yellow Tavern, Trevilian Station, White House creek, Winchester and Cedar Creek.

Mr. Alf is a past department commander of the James B. McKean post of Salt Lake City. For 30 years he has been a member of the I. O. O. F. lodge. He was for 10 years a member of the city board of education and is now serving his second term as city auditor.

Capt. Adolph Schender commanded the company of cavalry to which he belonged. He was known as a fearless and a brave soldier. His company was hurled against the enemy time and time again and medals for bravery were distributed to several members of the company. Mr. Alf was robbed of his medal by the wound in his wrist when he was dashing for the flag of the regiment which had fallen from the hands of a wounded cavalryman.

"I could ride a horse in those days," Mr. Alf said, "and his eyes moistened as he paused and his memory went back over those stirring days. 'I really begin to feel old,' he continued, 'for you know there is a great difference between a young man of 29 and a man of 68. I believe I would have to use a block and tackle now-days to mount a horse.'

Second Concert Enthuses The "Vets" and Their Ladies

But the heavy flag draping shut off the flow of air through the roof skylights, while back in the choir gallery the air was entirely dead, much to the deep discomfort of everybody there. However, the visitors took the situation good naturedly, fanned themselves and imagined cooler things.

The concert was pushed through without unnecessary delay, although it began late. That seems to be the trouble quite often with Tabernacle recitals. The quality of the performance was good—perhaps it would be better to say particularly so, in view of the climatic obstacles to ideal effort. They sang the "Soldiers' Chorus" and played two numbers to the delight of the audience, and then occupied the bishops' seats for the remainder of the evening.

The choir rendered "America" and "The Star Spangled Banner" with stirring enthusiasm. The flags were removed today, and the closing number, "The Star Spangled Banner," was sung by the choir and soloists. The closing concert tonight, will be conducted under less oppressive conditions.

SHEEP QUARANTINED.

Eight Wyoming Counties Under Ban Because of Leg and Lip Disease.

Owing to the presence of an infectious disease known as lip and leg disease or necrobacillosis of sheep, the secretary of agriculture has ordered a quarantine, effective August 12, on the counties of Fremont, Natrona, Carbon, Weston, Crook, Sheridan, Johnson, and Big Horn, in the state of Wyoming. Sheep that are affected with this disease will under no conditions be allowed to be moved interstate from the quarantine area. Sheep that have been exposed may be moved for stocking or feeding purposes after one dipping under government supervision, or they may be shipped interstate for immediate slaughter without dipping, under certain restrictions. Healthy sheep that have not been exposed may be moved interstate from the quarantine area only when accompanied by a certificate of inspection issued by an inspector of the bureau of animal industry.
