Last Night's Dispatches.

Gathering of Indian Lodges.

OMAHA, 7.—The following dis-
patch was received at the depart-
ment headquarters to-day from the

commanding officer at Fort Laramie:
"Spotted Tail, Chief of the
Brules, arrived here to-day on a
visit. He reports that his people
are at home and will not go out on
the war path. Large numbers have
gone from Red Cloud and other
agencies on the Missouri river, all
concentrating on Powder river for
a fight. The chiefs are haranguing
the men, urging them to stay in
camp and not with the troops some
to go out in small parties. He re-
ports over 1,000 lodges collected to-
gether.

Fine and Imprisonment.

St. LOUIS, 7.—Alfred Bevis, B.
Stearns, and John S. Smith, B.
Berkeley, Illinois distillers, were
sentenced to-day to pay a fine of
\$1,000 and one day's imprisonment.

Counterfeiters Arrested.

A gang of counterfeiters, having
their headquarters in and about
Mount Vernon, was broken up last
night by the arrest of six persons at
that place. A considerable
amount of bogus fifty cent
currency, and various implements used
in its manufacture were also
captured. Those captured at Mount
Vernon are charged with old and
respectable families at that place
and vicinity.

Republican Nomination.

GENESEE, N. Y., 7.—The republic-
an of the sixth Congressional dis-
trict, have, to-day, nominated
Thomas G. Henderson to Congress.

\$29,000 Fire.

NEW ORLEANS, 7.—A fire on
Josephine street, broke out last
night, destroying nineteen cottages,
including seven known as Mc-
Gullo's row. Estimated loss \$29,-
000; partly insured.

Democratic State Convention.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., 7.—The dem-
ocratic state convention met to-
day in this city. Hon. Moses M.
Strong presided. Theodore Ru-
dolf, of Lacrosse, James R. Do-
wling, of Racine, Geo. B. Smith,
of Dane, and Alexander Mitchell,
of Milwaukee, were chosen dele-
gates at large to the national con-
vention. Two delegates were also
chosen from each congressional
district. Of the twenty delegates
from the State seven are for Tilden
and three are uncommitted.

\$30,000 Fire.

LITTLE ROCK, 7.—The fine resi-
dence of Mr. Weeks is burning,
supposed to be the work of an in-
cendiary; loss \$20,000.

WESTERN.

The Anti-Corruption Arrest-
ed and Jailed.

SAN FRANCISCO, 7.—Three of the
leaders of the recent anti-corruption
movement in Carson, Nevada,
were arrested this morning and
jailed. Their followers threaten to
tear down the jail if they are not
released. To-morrow is the day
for another anti-corruption labor

are crowded; nothing else talked
of.

FOREIGN.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Medicine for the Disgrace-
ment.

LONDON, 7.—The Standard this
morning states that preparations
have been made to dispatch medi-
cal stores to Malta for \$50,000 in
addition to the force already on
the Mediterranean fleet.

A Berlin dispatch says the Ger-
man Emperor will go to London
the 14th. The Emperor will remain
there until the 18th. The two Em-
perors will meet again soon after-
wards at the Hague.

A correspondent at Paris tele-
graphs the contents of a note which
appears in the evening papers there,
and says he thinks it comes from
an official source. The note af-
firming that there is not any
foundation for various alarmist
rumors, and that the situation of
Europe was never less
threatened than now. There is not
a trace of any disagreement be-
tween Germany and Russia, and
the situation of the latter toward
England improves daily.

TURKEY.

Report on the Cause of the Sultan's
Death.

Constantinople, 7.—The official
report on the cause of the death
of the late Sultan, signed by nine
physicians and all nationalities
states that the following statement
Upon being summoned by the Sul-
tan to ascertain the cause of the
death of Abdul Aziz Khan, we
found that he had died of apoplexy.
All parts of the body were cold and
bloodless, except that the outside
was covered with congealed blood.
The face was not rigid; the eyes
and mouth partially open, and
limpid streaks of blood upon the
arms and legs. The veins and
arteries were hard, but the band of
the left arm were cut. On the
small veins of the right arm were
told that Abdul Aziz himself in-
flicted the above described wounds.
We are unanimously of the opinion
that death resulted from the ex-
cesses of the vessels of the arm, and
that the soldiers might produce the
wounds. The nature of the wounds
and the instrument which is said
to have produced them, caused us
to come to the conclusion that it
is a case of suicide.

FRANCE.

Funeral of the Deceased French

Paris, 7.—The funeral of M.
Maun, the French consul who
was murdered at Salonica, and
whose body was brought to France,
took place here to-day. The re-
mains were placed in the cata-
combs of the city, with great cere-
mony and military honors. The Duke
of Cases and department from both
Chambers attended the funeral.
