### EDITORIAL NOTES.

The Russian navy is to be strengthened by the addition of four ironclade, three cruisers and two gunboats. Two of the ironclads are for the Black Eea and the other ships for the Baltic.

It is stated by the Atlanta Constitution that the South has expended, this season in the North, \$55,000,000 for wheat, \$50,000,000 for corn, \$72,-000,000 for meats, \$25,000,000 for hay, butter, oats, cheese, etc., \$80,-000,000 for life, fire and marine insurance, \$50,000,000 for dry goods, liquors and groceries.


