MINING CONGRESS APPOINTS OFFICERS

Vice Presidents Appointed to Represent Congress in Each State.

SALT LAKERS ON COMMITTEES

Secretary Callbreath Sends Letter Outlining Work of Executive Committee at Denver.

In a letter to Judge W. P. Richards of Boise, Idaho, president of the American Mining Congress, Secy. Callbreath outlines the work done by the executive committee of the congress. In order to make the work of the organization more effective and to handle local conditions through a national organization, vice presidents have been appointed in each state. The vice president is the local head of the organization.

On the various committees of the congress are a number of Utah mining men. Among them are J. William Knight, Thomas Kearns and Capt. Duncan MacViechie. The letter reads as follows:

We attempted to have a meeting of our executive committee a few days ago, but in the absence of Col. Brownlee, we were obliged to call it a conference, at which Mr. Mills, Judge Colburn and Col. Eppig were in attendance.

It was suggested that the appointments should be as follows:

Practical committee to consist of the secretary, one to be suggested by Mr. John Dorn of Salt Lake and the third member to be chosen from Goldfield, at the suggestion of the chamber of commerce.

Auditing committee—F. J. Alexander and A. M. Donaldson, of Denver.

Protection against mining frauds—No definite conclusion reached.

Smelter rates—J. W. Knight of Provo, Harry L. Day of Wallace, W. J. Elmendorf, Spokane; J. H. Mackens, Goldfield; S. E. Bretherton, San Francisco. (The latter is the inventor of the Bretherton Smelting furnace and is a mining engineer and metallurgist of considerable note.)

Vertical Side Line Law Committee—Hon. Thomas Kerms, Salt Lake; Charles J. Hughes, Jr., Denver; R. A. F. Penrose, Philadelphia; George E. Collins, Denver, and J. W. Birch, Goldfield.

Committee on Mine Accidents—By resolution of the Pittsburgh convention, it is to be continued, as is also the committee on revision of mining laws and forestry.

REFERRED OTHER MATTERS.

The committee of three to which was referred resolutions Nos. 11, 12 and 13, particularly referring to the silver question, has been referred to a committee consisting of George H. Garrison, state mine inspector of Ohio; Mr. Roderick, state mine inspector of Pennsylvania and Mr. Ross, state mine inspector of West Virginia.

Committee on Amendments to By-Laws—Appointed in accordance with the resolution of Mr. Daniel, W. P. Danforth, E. A. Colburn and W. F. Mills.

Committee on Standardization of Electrical Equipment in Mines—To consist of two from representatives of manufacturers, two from labor organizations, two from operators and one independent electrical engineer. It is suggested that David B. Buchmore of the General Electrical company and Mr. Thomas of the Westinghouse company of Pittsburgh, represent the manufacturers; that the Coal Operators' association in the eastern section will be asked to name the two members to represent them; the American Federation of Labor and the U. M. W. of A. be each requested to name a member and that the independent man shall be Mr. Stratton, who is at the head of the Bureau of standards at Washington, and who is also upon the standardization committee of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers.

EXCHANGE DOES FAIR BUSINESS.

Although Trading is Slow, Number of Transactions is Fairly Large.

Although trading on the local stock exchange was extremely slow this morning, the volume of business was good and the number of stocks that changed hands was larger than at the morning session yesterday. The entire number of shares sold this morning was 12,250 and the amount represented by the transactions was \$48,225.

Throughout the session prices were lower with a tendency of sagging. The market appears to be getting into shape for another little spurt of speed toward the close. Stock taking has been going on during the day with a number of stocks. As soon as this is adjusted it is probable that the market will get into action for better things.

Addie, which has been engaged in trades for some time showed more activity again today and sold for 4% cents. Columbus Consolidated, which has been moving up for several days, started downward today. It opened at 31.50 and dropped to 31.35 at the close of the regular board session.

Clayo Copper climbed up 10 points this morning and sold at the opening at 35.00. The price was hammered down during the session and at the close was selling at 34.50.

Iron Blossom showed a greater tendency to go up than it has for some time. The highest cash sale in this stock was \$2.75, while it sold at \$2.80, buyer 60 days.

On the curb market Birmingham Central Standard sold for 30 1/2 cents, 31 cents and 32 cents. Utah Mine was offered at \$1.50. Deminjoh was offered at 12 cents and a bid of 9 cents was made at 18 cents and 33 cents was bid.
