WILL BECOME CHICAGO POLICE.

The committee on police reported on the petition of Chief Bonfield of the Columbian Secret Service at Chicago, recommended that two men be selected from two present police force by the committee on police and the chief of police, to be appointed by the Mayor and approved by by the Council, to act officially as representatives of Sait Lake City as indicated in the communication, the salary for such officers to be \$75 per month from Sait Lake City and \$50 per month from the secret service of the Columbian Exposition as offered in the communication. THE STANTON INVESTIGATION.

Hardy—I move that a resolution in relation to charges against our fire chief be taken up. The question hanging fire long enough. The resolution was as follows:

Whereas, Certain charges were heretofore presented to the Connell against W. A. S. anton, chief of the fire department of said city, which were referred by said Council to a special committee for investigation; and,

Moran—I move that the resolution be filed and the committee discharged. I don't believe the committee has ever that en investigation. Evidently they have found nothing in the charges by the man McIlry.

Horn-I am opposed to any further reference or giving the committee power to go on a smelling tour.

Kelly (hotly)—I presume it is merely facetiousness on the part of Messrs. Moran and Horn to talk as they do; certainly it is not earnestness. It seems to be simply a question of dog eat dog. W. A. Stanton succeeded in getting a larger communication in the Tribune than Mollroy did, but that is no reason why the committee should not have their powers enlarged.

Rich—I believe that the accused chief would prefer an investigation.

Bell-lam opposed to the granting the request unless I am informed what the tenor of the new charges will be,

Kelly—I have no animus towards our fire chief and I do not think specific charges should be made and published to the world, unless there is some foundation to them.

Moran—You gentlemen composing the committee ought to ask to remove Mr. Stanton because that is what you mean.

Beardeley (indignantly)-I deny the charge.

Kelly—I call the gentleman to order. His statements are wholly baseless.

Beardsley—So do I, Mr. President, so do I.

The Chair—The point is not wel taken. Some latitude must be allowed gentlemen in discussing the proposition.

Lawson—As to the investigation of this question the committee bave sought no newspaper notoriety. That is why we have proceeded carefully. This is a piece of work which the committee did not solicit. It was thrust upon it. Gallery talk and bold assertions like some of the councilmen make do not count.

The Chair—We are handling a matter which should be treated carefully. The committee in charge, in my opinion, are making a serious mistake. They should confine themselves merely to the matter delegated to them. No court or legislative body could legitimately grant them the blanket privilege they are asking for. If the committee has found anything wrong they should prefer the charges but not investigate them. I don't believe this resolution should be adopted under any consideration.

Hardy—Mr. Moran intimates that the committee were anxious to decapitate Mr. Stanton, whether he was guilty or not. I simply want to tell bim and all of you that the statement is false so far as I am concerned.

The motion to discharge the committee was lost ou a vote of seven to four.
