OLIVER SARTIN WINS. Jury Gives Him Verdict for \$5,272

Against Oregon Short Line. (Special to the "News.")

Ogden, Utah, April 11,-In the district court here this morning the jury in the case of Oliver Sartin vs the Oregon Short Line Railroad company, brought

in a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$5,272. The action was brought to recover \$30,000 for personal injuries leged to have been sustained by plaintiff while in the employ of defendant company by reason of the wilful negligence of the latter. The case has oc-cupied the attention of the court for the entire week, and the jury was out all night before reaching a verdict.

FITCH IN TROUBLE.

Former Salt Lake Attorney Charged With Conspiracy in Honolulu.

Advices from Honolulu indicate that Thomas Flich, formerly a well known attorney of this city, is in trouble there charged with conspiracy. The allega-

harged that Fitch offered to break the spendthrift trust and secure her re-lease. Fitch offered to take \$2,500 as a contingent fee. The case was won by the contestants in the lower court, but this decision was overruled in the high er court and Fitch was paid \$1,500. The

charge against Fitch was made by At-terner A. S. Humphreys, who asked that his fee be set aside. The court decided that the fee would have to be paid back by Fitch.
