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## Third District Court—Proceedings in the Third District Court, on Saturday, M. Schaeffer, Chief Justice, presiding:

W. C. Miller & Co. vs. Mrs. C. L. Stevens; trial by jury; jury charged and return verdict for the plaintiffs for \$32.07 without leaving their seats.

Henry Collins vs. Joseph Marion; motion to modify previous order, March 24, 1879, and to vacate the order of March 8th, in this case, argued and submitted March 31st, is now overruled by the court, to which defendant excepts.

Arie Pinedo vs. Wm. Nelson; defendant withdraws answer and judgment for plaintiff for possession of the property without damages.

Monroe Kling et al. vs. F. P. Longstreet; C. H. Lashbrook appears as defendant; adopts answer of F. P. Longstreet and is made the defendant.

G. R. Kennedy vs. Lewis & Co.; suit dismissed for want of prosecution.

John C. Ball, receiver, vs. John Terman et al.; jury trial continued; verdict for defendant.

Court adjourned till this morning at 9.30 o'clock.

Runaway Boys.—On Thursday last an eight-year old son of Mr. Lafayette Pierce, of Kayville, left his home, in company with a boy 13 years old, named Albert Watson. With young Pierce also disappeared the following described animal: A sorrel horse, white face and saddle marks, three white feet, and branded P on left shoulder. The two boys have been seen on the road, both riding this horse, but later have been seen to have a horse each. The horse Watson rode, and which is supposed to have been stolen, is a roan. ST. GEORGE STAKE QUARTERLY CONFERENCE.

The proceedings of Conference commenced at Priesthood meeting, at 4 p.m., on Friday, the 14th inst. At 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. of Saturday, 15th, and Sunday, 16th, meetings continued.

We were favored with the presence and address of the Brother Ernest Snow, of the Twelve Apostles, and of the other general authorities we had with us President W. H. Hancock, Henry Harrison and Jacob Gates, of the First Seven Presidents of Seventies.

Every ward in the Stake was also represented.

The speakers were addressed by Presidents E. Snow, Jacob Gates, J. D. McAllister, T. J. Jones and Henry Eyring; by Bishops William Snow, Robert Knell, Luke Sprague, George H. Crosby, Wm. A. Bringham, Thos. S. Terry and Chas. N. Smith; and by Elders Wm. Fawcett, president of the High Council, George H. Squire, president of the first Quorum of Elders and Henry W. Miller.

The chief subjects treated upon by the speakers were the necessity of the people accepting, and living according to, the principles of the holy United Order; the faithful observance of the law of tithing; the making of new will offerings for the building of temples; our encouraging experience in the progress and intellectual development of the

young of both sexes; the advisability of reasonably early marriages, according to the law of God and our young people; the necessity of our people keeping themselves from adopting the wicked ways of the world; the payment of P. E. fund indebtedness and of donating to that fund; and general exhortation to increased faithfulness in our daily work and conversation before the Lord.

Full and very satisfactory reports were read: Statistical, Relief Society, Young Men's and Young Ladies' M. I. Associations and Sunday Schools. Also tithing exhibit of all the wards in the Stake for 1878, with the average per tithing payer of each ward. Also report of the receipts and disbursements of St. George Temple treasury for 1878, and a statement of the ordinance work administered, together with report of the time spent by the brethren and sisters who officiate in the Temple, which showed a total of nearly eight thousand days' labor for 1878.

Wm. Barnes, John M. Meedy, Jr., Ernest B. Snow and Moroni Snow, all of St. George.

Charles Westover, Jun., of Leeds. James Knell, of Pinto.

A number of missionaries were also called for Mesquit Flat, in the lower valley of the Rio Virgin; and for Arizona and New Mexico.

We had a very lively, good, profitable time. The general feeling appeared to be that we ought to be together at least another day. God's good spirit evidently prompted the administration of the speakers, and brooded over the minds of the hearers. It was the general judgment that the conference was a good one, and its spirit blessing and encouragement to the Saints.

Animals and Poultry.

Running at Large.

"The attention of the inhabitants of Salt Lake City is respectfully directed to the following extracts from ordinances of said city now in force.

Trespass, and concerning animals running at large, Chap. XLII, Revised Ordinances:

Sec. 2.—No cattle, horses, mules, sheep, goats or hogs shall be allowed to run at large within the limits of this city, and all such animals, so found, may be taken up by any person and driven to the pound, and the owner of said animal shall be liable to pay a fine in any sum not exceeding \$10 for each animal.

Crimes and punishments, Chap. VII, Revised Ordinances:

Sec. 38.—and all fowl, such as turkeys, ducks, geese and hens found running at large at any time within the limits of this city, and the 1st day of October, shall be forfeited to and shall be liable to be killed by any person in and these premises they may be found trespassing.

Complaint has been made that persons herding cows and other animals on the bench lands adjoining the city, allow such animals to leave their herds to commit trespass and damage upon the first garden or orchard into which they can gain entrance. Such gross carelessness should be guarded against, or a too frequent repetition thereof may submit the herder to heavy damages.

As it becomes my duty to see that the above provisions of law are complied with, let all persons take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.
