THE MULAIN ATTACHMENTS.

A Receiver Appointed to Take Charge of and Sell the Property.

In the suit of John H. Allbright et al. vs. F. E. McClain, J. M. Cochran and Nat M. Brigham, an application for the appointment of a receiver was made to Judge Bartels in chambers this afternoon. The same was granted and J. M. Forbes was appointed by agreement of all the parties.

The receiver's name was fixed at \$1,000.

A number of attachment suits have been filed against the defendant McClain during the past few days. His attorney has been forced upon him to file a motion for a change of venue of the attachment—either of a stock of dry goods, some 145,000 in number, kept in the basement of the City house, and a store of merchant tailoring goods, furniture and fixtures in the same room No. 12, or against him with another.

McClain has absented from the Territory and his present whereabouts are said to be unknown. His trial is indefinitely in the various attaching suits, and he is not likely to be tried in the state of Utah at any time in the near future.

The goods are valued at \$25,000, and the asking price, \$10,000.

The defendant Cochran claims to have a bill of sale over this property and contents, it is not likely that he will be able to prove it.

The plaintiffs insist, however, that the pretended transfer and bill of sale are fraudulent and void as against the creditors.

STARTED BY CHILDREN.

They Were Playing with Matches and With the usual Result.

A one story stone residence at No. 211 south Second West street, occupied by J. S. Hill and owned by a Mr. Minhill, was the scene of a great fire which this afternoon that resulted in the building having a narrow escape from destruction.

According to the statements of Mrs. Hill, to Assistant Chief Danvers a couple of her children were playing in the bed room with matches obtained from the bureau. A number of them were struck and some of the burning on the floor spread rapidly and soon the clothing and window curtains were consumed.

The fire department responded to an alarm and the flames were extinguished by means of a garden hose. The loss will exceed \$100; no insurance.
