FOREIGN.

LONDON, 26.—Russia has again informed Germany that she sees no cause to modify her attitude towards Spain.

PARIS, 26.—President MacMahon has arrived at Angers.

The Carlist leaders Sparra and the Viscount de Latorre have been arrested by the French authorities at Port Vendres, on the frontier; they showed false passports, and have been taken to Perigueux, where they are now interned. The authorities keep a close watch on the frontier, and the Carlists are consequently straightened for provisions.

President MacMahon arrived in the city at midnight.

It is reported that during recent excavations at Amboise, the body of Leonardo da Vinci was discovered in perfect preservation.

BRUSSELS, 26.—In the International Congress the protocols of its proceedings have been read and approved.

The Prince of Wales has arrived in this city, on his way to Berlin.

LONDON, 27.—The Daily News announces that the strike at Belfast is ended, and that all the operatives, forty thousand in number, have resumed work in the factories at reduced wages.

LONDON, 28.—The British steamship *Liffy*, plying between Southampton and South American ports, ashore on the coast of Uruguay, is a total loss; the passengers, crew, mails and specie were saved.

ST. PETERSBURG, 28.—The Grand Duke Vladimir was married today, to the Duchess of Mecklenburg.

LONDON, 29.—The Chinese are reported to be threatening the Russian province of Kuldj; the Russians are constructing a road from Semipalatinsk to the Chinese frontier.

LONDON, 29.—A Brussels telegram says the International Conference, at a full sitting, rejected the four introductory general principles proposed by Russia, and all the proposals concerning reprisals. The course of the deliberations has been peaceful, and there has been no recognition between the German and French delegates.

LONDON, 31st, 5.30 a.m.—Quarantine regulations have been put into force at Queenstown, which is a cause of great hindrance to commerce. All persons are prohibited from leaving or embarking on vessels from ports in America, the West Indies and the Mediterranean Sea, until it is ascertained whether such vessels have a clear bill of health.

BRUSSELS, 29.—The final sitting of the international conference was held yesterday. All of the members signed the protocol except the delegates from Great Britain and Turkey, who postponed attaching their signatures.

PARIS, 29.—MacMahon has signed a decree, ordering elections in seven departments on the 4th of October, to fill vacancies in the Assembly.

VIENNA, 30.—The *New Free Press* publishes the text of the circular note, from the Russian government, dated Aug. 19th, declining to recognize Spain. The note says that Russia cannot recognize a government which is unrecognized in its own country. She has no wish to interfere in the internal affairs of Spain, and favors no party there. She will officially communicate with any government which possesses legal authority and promise to be permanent. Germany and Austria are free to act in this matter in accordance with their own interests.
