RICHMOND, Va., 14.—The official  
return from 65 cities and counties  
in Virginia show a majority of  
Tilden of over 40,000. The remain-  
ing counties will increase these  
figures about 2,000. In the sixth  
district Tucker's majority for Con-  
gress is 5,288; in the seventh dis-  
trict Harris' majority is 10,895; in  
the eighth district Hunt's major-  
ity is 6,485. Full returns have  
not been received from the remain-  
ing districts; but in the first,  
second, third, fifth and ninth dis-  
tricts the democratic candidates  
have equally large majorities as  
above. Jorgensen, in the fourth  
district, is the only republican  
elected, his majority will be be-  
tween seven or eight hundred.  
There is talk of a contest in this  
case.

**Arrangements for a Fair and Hon-  
est Count.**  
NEW ORLEANS, 14.—The follow-  
ing explains itself.  
To Hon. Stanley Matthews,  
James Garfield, John A. Logan,  
William D. Kelley, John J. Kasson,  
J. Irvin, John H. Schenck,  
Wm. M. Farris, E. W. Stoughton,  
Jas. H. Dix and others.—The  
undersigned arrived here yesterday.  
They came in answer to a telegram  
from Hon. Abraham S. Hewitt,  
chairman of the national demo-  
cratic committee, dated at New  
York, Nov. 10th, 1876, as follows:  
"Citizens of New Orleans urgently  
request that a delegation of prom-  
inent gentlemen come here at  
once to counsel peace and fair  
and honest returns. You are earnestly  
requested to be one of ten or fifteen  
gentlemen, all widely known, to  
meet at the Louisville Galt House  
on Saturday evening, proceeding  
directly south, or, if more con-  
venient, meeting at the St. Charles  
Hotel, New Orleans, on Monday  
morning. Your prompt acceptance  
by telegraph is requested. This  
emergency requires that you be  
ready to start at once."  
The undersigned are informed  
that you have been chosen by the  
request of the President of the United  
States to see that the board of can-  
vassers make a fair count of the  
late canvass. While in the  
late canvass you gave your support  
to Hayes and Wheeler, as candi-  
dates for President and Vice Presi-  
dent, and the undersigned gave  
their support to Tilden and Hen-  
dricks for these offices. They feel  
assured that all citizens of all par-  
ties regard an honest count and  
true return of the vote actually cast  
of greater moment than the success  
of any candidate for office, and are  
ready to do all that honorable men  
should do to secure such returns of  
the vote cast at the late election in  
Louisiana, which assumes, more  
than before, national importance,  
and upon which, in this crisis, may  
depend the very existence of the  
constituted government. The  
undersigned, therefore, in view of  
the unhappy controversies which  
have heretofore arisen from the ac-  
tion of the returning board of State,  
its action in the late election,  
change the result of a presi-  
dential election, and in view of a  
desire of all good men that effect  
should be given to the will of the  
people, they earnestly request  
that you, or such of you as are  
present, to meet and confer  
with them, personally or through  
committees, as may be deemed

spect and acquiescence of the  
American people of all parties.

**An Explanation.**  
MILWAUKEE, 14.—The facts con-  
cerning the report that one demo-  
cratic candidate for governor was  
in Wisconsin are as follows:  
It was discovered several weeks be-  
fore the election that Miner, a re-  
publican candidate for governor, was  
postmaster. He was, therefore, re-  
moved from the ticket, and Downs  
substituted. The blanks for returns  
by the Secretary of State to the  
lower officers of election contained  
Miner's name instead of Downs'.  
Upon learning this the chairman of  
the republican State central com-  
mittee caused circulars to be sent to  
these officers instructing them to  
erase Miner's name and insert  
Downs'. In a few cases, so far as  
learned, this was not done, and the  
votes were returned as if they had  
been returned for Downs, but the  
number is not sufficient to raise  
any doubt about Downs' election.
