WASHINGTON, 15.—Logan took the
floor in support of the movement for
open executive sessions. He preferred
his own resolution, he said, because it
provided broadly for open sessions on
all matters of nomination and con-
firmation without going into the story of
secret sessions.

Howe asked Mr. Logan whether his
motion would require the proceed-
ings of committees also to be open to
the public.

Logan replied: "Not at all; but why
should not the committee meetings be
open to the public if anybody wanted
them to be?"

Howe said that hardly any proceed-
ings were of more importance or of
more public interest than the proceed-
ings of the committee on ways and
means of the House of Representatives,
or the finance committee of the Senate,
and especially important were the
proceedings of the finance com-
mittee on the question of revenue.

After further debate the Senate went
into executive session, and when the
doors reopened adjourned.

provisions of the law relative to the
immediate transportation of dutiable
goods on which no duty is levied.
