An immense mine of coal has been discovered in Uintah county, Wyoming, near Carter Station, on the Union Pacific. It was discovered by Mr. Crocker, of Logan, from information he received from an old Indian, who showed him a piece of fine looking coal which he

Bank of England Counterfeits. In the report of the Parliament-ary Select Committee on Banks of Issue, some very curious informa-tion is given about forgeries on the Bank of England, a table was pre-pared for the committee by the Bank efficials, stating the number and kinds of ferged notes presented at the Bank for the past seventy years. In the early part of the cen-

presented at the Bank, with small proportions of higher nominal value. Since 1820 there has been a rapid decline in the circulation Bank of England, and in 1874 only fifty - six counterfeited £1 notes came to light, and thirty-five of other denominations. The forged £1 notes appear to be mostly the work of a former age. For fifty years the Bank has ceased to issue this denomination. The new counterfeits which appear are chiefly of the £5 note. Of these 27 were presented in 1874 of value of all the counterfeits taken from circula-tion in the latter year was £33,682, against £475 in 1874. This remarkble contrast is almost wholly owing to the unsparing energy of the Bank of England in discovering and arresting those who tamper with its issues, and the very severe penalty inflicted on convicted counterfeiters.
