

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

TO OUR ADVERTISERS.—We hope those of our patrons, whose advertisements are unavoidably omitted to-day, will excuse us on account of the press of very interesting matter.

SABBATH MEETINGS.—Yesterday morning the congregation was addressed by Elders H. B. Clemmons, Karl G. Maeser, and H. O. Spencer, returned missionaries, who related some of their experience while preaching the gospel in England and on the continent of Europe. They were followed by President Brigham Young, who delivered a short but very interesting discourse, which was reported and will appear in the News.

In the afternoon the assembly, in the New Tabernacle, was addressed by Elder Orson Pratt, who delivered a discourse founded on the 31st and following verses of the 2nd chapter of Daniel's prophecies, showing the rise, progress and decay of the empires typified by the image there mentioned, and the final rise of the kingdom of God—the stone cut out of the mountain, which was to smite the image, eventually fill the whole earth, and endure for ever. Elder Pratt's remarks were reported and will probably appear in the News.

THE MAILS AGAIN.—We have almost daily complaints coming to us concerning mail delinquencies. A citizen of Mant, San Pete county, staying in the city for a time, has experienced perplexing annoyances in obtaining advices from his family in Mant. The first letter, received some weeks since, reached him in this city after a six or seven days' journey, the time of transit exactly corresponding with that consumed by an ox team which left Mant on the same day with the mail! Subsequently, he has been assured that letters have been posted to him regularly once a week; but, for six weeks past, he has failed to receive any thing by mail. The last letter he took from the postoffice, he informs us, had been opened by some person to him unknown; as the opener had written upon the envelope, "opened by me through mistake," but made a greater mistake in omitting to sign his name, as by law required. The P. O. regulations are justly exacting in these respects. Should it occur that two persons of precisely the same name (which is but rare) call for mail matter and the one get hold of that which belongs to the other, it is imperative that the unconscious trespasser should place his signature upon the document in justification of the act. Otherwise, it becomes criminal and subjects the offender to severe penalties.

If we mistake not, post office clerks have a degree of responsibility in such cases, and are liable to the parties injured for delivering letter or other mail matter to unauthorized or irresponsible parties. Radical reform in these respects is loudly demanded at the hands of our postal agents and all connected with the distribution and delivery of mails.

The gentleman referred to in the above was quite willing to have his name published, if it had been considered necessary to substantiate the truth of his statement!
