Former Commissioner Joseph Stanford Appointed Poor Clerk At Salary of \$80 Per Month.

CAR BLOWN UP BY POWDER.

Brakeman T. W. Murphy Injured-Funeral of Banker Guthrie-Damage Suit Compromised.

Ogden, Nov. 13 .- At the session of the county commissioners yesterday the board appointed former Commissioner Joseph Stanford as poor clerk at a salary of \$80 per month. Mr. Stanford has been acting in that capacity since he tendered his resignation as a member of the board. He has perhaps a better knowledge of that class of the better knowledge of that class of the county work than any other person, due to the fact that he has handled it for so long and his appointment will pernit the county to continue the handling of the indigent people along the same lines heretofore adopted.

The petition of the Utah Light & Railway company, asking for that company the right to construct and company a system of poles and trans-Railway company the right to construct and maintain a system of poles and transmission lines along all of the county roads for a period of 50 years, was granted. The application for the franchise was presented at the previous session of the board. The purpose of the franchise is to enable the power people to extend their system to the smaller settlements of the county. In this connection it is said that they will spend at least \$200,000 in this county.

CAR BLOWN UP. Brakeman T. W. Murphy Injured by

Explosion of Powder. Ogden, Nov. 13 .- While the train was ogden, Nov. 13.—While the train was runing at full speed, a consignment of powder loaded into a car of merchandise in a Southern Pacific train, exploded, blowing off the upper part of the car and painfully injuring a brakeman named T. W. Murphy of this city. Although the explosion was a heavy one, the force went upward, leaving the racks on the rails and the bottom of

wreck.

The accident occurred at a small station named Teck on the main line, 93 miles west of Ogden and but a short distance from Jackson, where the disastrous explosion occurred a few years ago. The powder was shipped from San Jose, Cal., and was consigned to a salt Lake firm. There was nothing on Salt Lake firm. There was nothing on Sait Lake firm. There was nothing on the outside of the car to show that there was a shipment of powder loaded therein. Ordinarily this is done, but it was omitted by some one in this case Accordingly the car was placed in the train next to the locomotive. It is supposed that a spark from the engine got into the interior of the car through ne opening and serted a small fire ich ignited the powder. At the time the accident, Head Brankeman, T. W. Murphy was riding in the engine cab and was looking out of the window.


