OBITUARY.

MACFARLANE.—Andrew Nevin Macfarlane, Second Counselor to Bishop W. L. N. Allen of the 21st Ward, whose death occurred yesterday was the son of James Macfarlane and Ann Nevin, both natives of Perthshire, West Highlands of Scotland, and of a line of Jacobites. He was born in Dundee, Forfarshire, Scotland, June 10, 1830.

He first heard the Gospel in its fulness in 1845, and being soon convinced of the divinity of the message, was baptized on the 17th of April, 1847, by Elder Hugh Findlay. Subsequent to his baptism his mother and sister also embraced the Gospel, which gave him intense satisfaction.

On September 26th, 1847, the subject of this sketch was ordained to the office of Teacher, and on December 29th, 1848, he was ordained a Priest. He preached the Gospel with great zeal and success, and being quite young and often seen preaching in public, he became widely known as the "boy preacher." He was ordained an Elder May 17th, 1850, and was sent to Aberdeen to labor in the ministry. On Dec. 16th, 1850, he married and again took up his residence in Dundee, where he labored zealously for the truth, being for many years president of the Dundee branch.

On January 30th, 1860, he was appointed to preside over the Dundee conference, which position he held until the summer of 1868, when he was released, with the privilege of immigrating to Zion. He embarked at Liverpool, June 30th, 1868, in a steamer. From the port of landing in this country he came by rail to Laramie, thence by team to this city, reaching here late in August of that year.

Before immigrating, he held for many years a responsible position in a large clothing house in Scotland, and for many years he had a similar position in the clothing department of Z. C. M. I.

On October 19, 1869, Brother Macfarlane was ordained a Seventy and became a member of the 13th Quorum. When the Twenty-first Ward was organized, he became president of its Y. M. M. I. A., holding that position four terms in succession. He also held the position of assistant superintendent of the Sunday school of that ward until duty required him to leave it. At the April conference, 1881, he was called on a mission to Great Britain. He reached Liverpool on May 7th, and was assigned to labor in Scotland. Being released, he returned home in November, 1882.

On October 21st, 1883 he was chosen by Bishop W. L. N. Allen of the Twenty-first Ward, to be his second counselor, which position he held at the time of his death. In February, 1884, he was elected a member of the City Council of Salt Lake City, and served the term to the best of his ability.

His death closes a life work characterized by activity, zeal, faithfulness, integrity, and a great variety of labors and many vicissitudes. He was a type of a noble class of men whom the Gospel has brought forward and who are always missed when called away.
