TAKING OF FURTHER TESTIMONY.

GEOLOGY.

Interest Lecture by Dr. Talboys to an Appreciative Audience.

A lecture delivered by Dr. James F. Talboys last evening was given in an auditorium which was well represented by the very large audience as was shown by the electric storm given. The aisles and entrance of the hall were crowded and they had to move for lack of room.

The literary field of the science of geology was the subject of the lecture, with the speaker reverted in the consideration of considering geology as merely a study of the crust of the earth in lithology and mineralogy, and the author of the book, "The Story of the Earth," a member of the great geological society, and it cannot be expected to say of the three kingdoms of nature, mineral, plant or animal, that he did not speak with great interest and replaced by time investigation. The speaker cast light upon the description of our oldest record—"in the beginning." What man calls the beginning may be the end of the record of the past. The past was illustrated by means of a map of coal bearing in Europe and Asia. The existence of the coal seems to be at an end but new ones have come into being. The story of the coal was told in detail, and the premises that all geological times have always acted at the same rate intensity received full illustrations and weight.

The speaker looked back as far as he could as every book of truth, which can be perceived, of wrongly applied; assuredly the little was not more than a textbook of Geology. The lecture was then used to illustrate an historical record of the world, between 1000 and 5000 years ago, the monuments being shown. The number of the terms, earth's crust, was reviewed. By pictures and models diagrams and tables were given, and maps were shown, illustrating the great structures of the Mexican era of vegetation, the great field, basin, mountains, and oceans. By the way, the speaker mentioned many cities, cities with millions of inhabitants, were built together in books. The remains of ancient removed mountains, and the great field, and the great ice cap covering the top of the earth, and the skills of the people.

The speaker showed clearly that there had been a great development in the development of the earth, in the age, perhaps, to be measured by millions, in the greatest extension of the world's land area; this extent of the earth is to be measured, but was destined to be no change, but an ever growing place of a great creature's home.

THE BOND QUESTION.

Brennan of St. Louis, the Fourth District Federal Clerk.

At a meeting of the Fourth judicial court held last evening in Targett's Hall the question of holding Salt Lake County, for \$20,000 was discussed.

H. H. Day was elected chairman, after which Harry W. Lawrence spoke against the bonds of bonds. The city, he said, was rapidly becoming more and more populous, and the bonds were a mortgage on every man's property and increased the rate of taxation, which would increase the taxes. He proposed that the bonds should be reduced instead of increasing debts of future generations to pay. The voting of bonds to increase a tax, and at the same time to increase the rate of taxation, was out of the question. He favored the discharge of the indebtedness of the county gradually instead of paying \$2 for \$1, as would be done by levying taxes.

John C. Tindall made a statement of the condition of the county's finances. He said when the new collection took charge of the affairs, warrants in the sum of \$20,000 had been issued and the county was unable to meet them, and the amount of the bonds was \$27,000 for which warrants had been issued. Under the ruling of the Supreme court, it was held that the county could not contract indebtedness in any one year in excess of \$10,000, and that it was the duty of the county to meet its obligations without creating bonds, and they were ready the county's bonds could be exchanged on a cash basis, and the bonds of the county at least \$10,000 a year.

Warren Foster spoke in opposition to the bond issue, which strongly urged the signing of the bonds or the future generation to a promise to pay money to the county, and the bonds were to be sold to the county to avoid the circumstances.
