Rep. Livernash Introduces a Joint Resolution in House Defining Them.

THE COLOMBIAN SOVERIGNTY.

Declares United States Has No Intention to Impair it or Support The New Republic.

Washington, Dec. 4.- Representative Livernash of California, introduced a joint resolution today "defining the intention of the United States concerning the 1sthmus of Pansma." It disclaims on the part of the United States any intention to impair Colombian sovereignty or to support the republic of Panama against Colombia or to interfere in the relations between Colombia and Panama

FROM MINISTER BEAUPRE.

Washington, Dec. 4 .-- Minister Beau-Washington, Dec. 4.—Minister Beaupre, at Bogote, has advised the state department that the Hay-Herran canal treaty was rejected by the Colombian government on its merits; that is to say, that the treaty itself, in its text and its spirit, was regarded as objectionable. Mr. Beaupre is confident that nothing in the instructions he had received from Washington relative to the presentation of the treaty in Bogota in the slightest degree influenced the adverse action upon that conven-tion of the Colombian senate. The minister's advices were "To set out the fact that the Colombians still are hopeful of being able to negotiate a new treaty with the United States in place of the failed Hay-Herran treaty and regretting the adverse action of their senate, are willing to extend to the United States terms much more favorable than those contained in that treaty. Promises have gone so far that treaty. Promises have gone so far that they indicate that the present congress might be dissolved and a new congress chosen by order of the president, and that the latter would see to it that the new congress would be favorable to any canal treaty that he might submit for its ratification."

Seev. Hay will tomorrow present Gen. Reyes to President Roosevelt. The scretary is satisfied as to the plenipotentiary powers possessed by Gen.

potentiary powers possessed by Gen. Reves and will afford him every op-portunity to discharge his mission. But the fact is not concealed that there is no hope of success.

RUSSIA'S REPLY TO JAPAN NEARLY READY.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 4.-Russia's re-St. Petersburg, Dec. 4.—Russia's reply to Japan's proposals is almost completed, but will not be ready for transmission to Tokio until next week, A strong hope is expressed in official circles that the answer will prove acceptable to Japan in the main, if not in all the details. Russia will make concessions, but in turn propose modifications which it is said will not be of a radical which, it is said, will not be of a radical character. It is reiterated that the present state of the negotiations is confined to a determination of the general question relating to the rights of the respective powers in Corea. The czar and the foreign office have freely consulted Viceroy Alexieff in the preparation of the reply. While it is not admitted that the meeting of the Japanese parliament Dec. 8 has hastened the matter, there has been unusual activity at the foreign office for several days.

Bryan Takes an Appeal.

New Haven, Conn., Dec. 4.-Counsel for William J. Bryan, executor of the will of the late Philo S. Bennett, filed an appeal in the superior court today from the decision of Probate Judge Cleaveland by which the sealed letter giving \$50,000 to Mr. Bryan and his family was excluded from probate. It will come up for a hearing at the January term of the superior court, together with the appeal already filed by counsel for Mrs. Bennett, the widow. The latter appeal is from the decision of Judge Cleaveland admitting to probate the sections of of the will naming Mr. Bryan as executor, and giving him funds in trust for college scholarships

Asked to Resign and Did.

Chicago, Dec. 4.—John J. Brown, for-mer secretary of the Chicago police pension board, but later connected with pension board, but later connected with the city clerk's effice, was today asked to resign from the public service. He promptly acceded to the request. The resignation resulted from an investiga-tion by the aldermanic committee re-garding charges of extortion by widows who were applicants for pensions.

No Negotiations for St. Pierre.

Paris, Dec. 4.—An authoritative denial s given to the report circulated in America that negotiations are in progress for the sale of the colony of St. Pierre and Miquelon, off the south coast of Newfoundland, by France to the United States. It is added that the islands are now quiet, in spite of the excitement last summer, caused by the expulsion of the clericals.

Sugar Bounty Law.

St. Paul, Dec. 4 .- The supreme court today declared that the state was un-der no moral obligation to pay a sugar bounty under the law enacted in 1895, and declares the law unconstitutional.

The Minnesota Sugar company sued the state and secured a bounty of \$20,100, which it is claimed it had carned under the sugar bounty act of 1895.

Gave His Life for Others.

Ontario, Or., Dec. 4.-Peter Russell, Ontario, Or., Dec. 4.—Peter Russell, foreman of a railroad bridge crew, lost his life last night while trying to save a special train from wreck. Russell, with three of his men, were returning from Washoe on a handcar when they heard the train approaching. Two of the men jumped, while Russell and another attempted to remove the handcar from the track. It was almost off the track when the train struck it, throwing Russell 60 feet into the air and injuring him so that he died shortly after. None of the other men were hurt.
