

the treaty. In the Legislative Assembly the Attorney General moved a series of resolutions in opposition to the treaty. The hope is expressed that the Canadian Parliament will not ratify the treaty, but will still carry out its policy of protecting the fisheries. The Attorney General delivered a long and able speech in support of his resolutions. He repelled the idea that the province would be forced into annexation by the treaty, and said of the mother country that though she should slay me, yet will I trust in her. There is no doubt the resolutions will pass both houses without a dissenting voice. The fishermen of Bay Fundy are alarmed and indignation, and steps are being taken for holding a public meeting. Intelligence from Nova Scotia and Prince Edward's Island represents a similar state of public feeling prevailing there.

ASPINWALL, 15, via Kingston and Jamaica.—Manuel Diaz, commanding eight hundred insurgents, is marching on Panama and is within nine miles of the city. The force is armed with Remington rifles and cannon. The government troops are prepared to offer a stout resistance to the further advance of the rebels, and a battle is daily expected. The steamer *Montigo* has not yet been re-captured from the insurgents and her whereabouts is unknown. Wildest rumors are afloat and the greatest excitement prevails.

The boiler of a steamer plying on the Magdalena river, and while going to time exploded. Fourteen persons were killed. The Digue Company has ordered two new steamers to be constructed at Pittsburg. Guatemala revolution is without importance. President Buenos and two generals have been delivered to the new government. They will be heavily fined and banished. Nicaragua has demanded from Salvador the release of General Martinez, on the ground that he is a citizen of Nicaragua. Soldiers of Xatruch's army are returning and will acknowledge allegiance to the new government of Salvador.

PARIS, 18.—The Versaillesists attacked Montrouge, but reinforcements arrived and the attack was repulsed. Several cannon were captured. The attack on the village of Vanvres was also repulsed. The Versaillesists were beaten in the Bois de Boulogne, and before the Maillet gate. The latter is destroyed. The Versaillesists' flag floats on Vanvres.

BERLIN, 19.—Bismarck goes to Frankfurt to meet Favre and Poyer, to exchange the ratifications.

LONDON, 19.—In the House of Commons Martin resumed his speech condemning the suspension of the *habeas corpus* in Ireland. He said there was more crime in Lancashire than in West Meath, yet its suspension there was never dreamed of.

FREDERICKTON, 19.—The Legislature of New Brunswick has adopted, by unanimous vote in both branches, the resolutions condemning the terms of the Treaty of Washington, in so far as they affect the interests of Canada.

PARIS, 19.—Twenty-one members of the Commune no longer attend but remain in the arrondissements.

Four hundred Versaillesists are said to have deserted yesterday.

Batteries at the Dauphin gate also new barricades and a small fortress.

LONDON, 19.—The frigate *Galatea*, with the Duke of Edinburgh, has arrived.

The Paris safety committee decrees the suppression of the *Revue de Deux Mondes*, *Avenir*, *National*, *Patrie*, *Commune Justice*, and five other papers. No new journals will be established till the war is over. Writers who sign articles attacking the government are punishable by martial law; officers hesitating to obey are guilty of treason.

McMahon tells his soldiers that the communists have destroyed the Vendome column, which foreigners left undisturbed, and exhorts them to avenge it.

Specials agree that a reign of terror exists in Paris; many are imprisoned, and the lives of hostages are despaired of.

The *Daily News* says it is reported that the Versaillesists occupy Clichy. There was a sharp engagement at Asnieres. It is rumored the Versaillesists attempted to storm the Dauphine gate and were repulsed.

The *Paris Journal* says Broglie replaces Favre after the ratification of peace.

The *Times* says the nationals stopped the service at St. Augustine and Trinity churches, and turned out the Sisters of Mercy. The federals were beaten at the zoological gardens. The Prussians are near Fonfons.

HAVRE, 20.—The American steamship *Relief* is here.

The Prussians have evacuated Yvtoe. VERSAILLES, 20.—Rocheport was arrested attempting to escape from the Commune and brought to Versailles today.

The steamer *William 3rd* was burned near Ventour. It is supposed all on board were saved.

PARIS, 20.—Two spies were shot yesterday.

Four individuals are condemned to death on account of the explosion.

The central committee is again the principal power.

The Commune journals declare the federal position solid everywhere. The organization is improved and the positions are strengthened.

The Prussians are at Auberville and Condé strongly entrenched.

St. CLOUD, 19, 1:30 p.m.—A battle is raging at Neuilly, twenty thousand are engaged. At two o'clock the line of battle extended from the Bois de Boulogne to Clichygate. No decisive result yet.

The first hostages selected for execution are the Archbishop and Abbes de Guerry and Coole.

VERSAILLES, 20.—The federalists have planted four mitrailleuses on the Rue Peyronnet barricade. The commissioner orders the inhabitants occupying corner houses to leave, as such were to be occupied for loophole musketry.

LONDON, 20.—The *Daily News* says the reports of the Prussians going to attack Paris are unfounded. Several engagements have occurred at Neuilly.

The *Telegraph* says it is reported that Favre will leave the ministry. Letters have been intercepted implicating Gambetta. A flag of truce arrived at Versailles from Paris. Dispatches from Paris say wounded are constantly arriving. The Communists are dispirited and preparing to explode the ramparts.

Dispatches from Paris report that all the attacks from the Versaillesists' troops, on Friday and Saturday, were repulsed. M. Puyat proposed, in the Commune, laws for the taxation of bachelors and the abolition of the confessional. There was heavy fighting yesterday on the west and south-west, but, according to the communist reports, it was without important results. The officers of the Montmartre battery claim that they have dismounted the guns of the Versaillesists at Gennevillle. The inhabitants of Malakoff and the villages near Vaugirard and Montrouge are flying from their dwellings. The central committee orders all Parisians to return to their domiciles within forty-eight hours, on pain of forfeiture of the rents standing in their names. In an undated official report the Commune announces that its forces have been successful in several engagements.

LONDON, 21.—Dispatches from Versailles say that three formidable breaching batteries, mounted on the slope of Mount Valerien, have opened fire on the ramparts in the Autenil quarter. The government troops are all ready to storm the city. A violent cannonade was kept up on Saturday night.

PARIS, Sunday afternoon.—The federal troops have abandoned their position at Malakoff, Petit Vanvres and Grand Montrouge. The government troops surround Fort Montrouge, which only maintains communication with Paris, by a subterranean passage. Federal forces are re-entering the city in the greatest disorder. Shells are falling in Montrouge. The inhabitants are terror-stricken. Many have been killed.

The Versaillesists have not attempted an assault on the South. A terrible bombardment sweeps the ramparts. The federals are making desperate efforts to repair and protect the gates. General Cecilia has returned to Paris. The only generals now outside the walls are Dombrowski, who is in the Bois de Boulogne, near Port de la Muette, and Wroblewski, who is making a stand at Gentilly. The Versaillesists attacked and captured part of the latter suburbs. Autenil is subjected to a violent bombardment. Autenil gate has been abandoned by the federalists, whose outposts have fallen back inside the city.

VERSAILLES, Sunday evening, 21.—The Versailles forces entered Paris at four o'clock this afternoon. The entrance was effected simultaneously at two points, the gate St. Cloud, near the Point du Jour, and the gate of Montrouge, on the Boulevard of Marne. The insurgents have abandoned the ramparts.

VERSAILLES, Sunday night, 21.—There is a circular from Thiers, officially confirming the entrance of the troops into Paris. It says the gate of

St. Cloud having been battered down, General Donai rushed in. Generals L. Amiraunt and Clinchamps are preparing to follow.

Since the issue of the above circular of the government, news has been received that Donai's men hold their positions inside St. Cloud, where they have cut the telegraph wires communicating with other portions of the enceinte. A flag of truce was hoisted at the Autenil gate. Two regiments entered there and proceeded beyond the viaduct.

General Cissey reports that Malakoff and Fort Montrouge have been abandoned by the insurgents, and will soon be occupied by his command, but the battalions on the ramparts opposite are still firing.

There is a panic in Paris. It is said that Pyatt, Grousett and other rebel leaders have disappeared.

The Assembly, to-day, adopted a motion demanding a decision of the French and Prussian authorities as to what town shall be garrisoned by German soldiers.

PARIS, 20.—An important engagement is reported to have occurred today near Autenil and Passy. The result is as yet unknown. Fort Montrouge still holds out.

The Governor of Fort Bicetre has been arrested.

The Versaillesists in the Bois de Boulogne have made several distinct attempts to storm the ramparts of Paris, but in no case was the assault a serious one. A great number of federal troops have been concentrated at threatened points.

The minority party in the Commune and the military commission have been replaced by Communists of a more radical type.

The church of Notre Dame has been sacked and is now occupied by federal troops.

MADRID, 20.—The government will propose in its next budget that the effective force of the army be fixed at eighty thousand men.

LISEON, 20.—Dissensions have broken out between the Government and the Chamber of Deputies.

FRANKFORT, 20.—Bismarck, Poyer, Quertier and Favre arrived in this city to-day, for the purpose of exchanging ratifications of the treaty of peace. All the public buildings and a great many private residences are decorated with flags in honor of the occasion.
