The gang left town for the time being and another put in its appearance and rented the same rooms from Mrs. Peterson This gang was headed by Harry Walter, who passed under the name here of Sullivan, and "Dr" Clark, who here of Sunivan, and Dr Clark, who bere the name of Pittman. With them were Jesse Gudahay and one Thompson. They early came to grief, A miner from Goldfield was pulled in by Thompson. Of course he lost some money, and naturally he equealed. The gang was promptly arrested. They pleaded guilty to vargancy and were pleaded guilty to vagrancy and were given a chance to leave town. As usu-al, Atty. William Newton was the lawyer responsible for getting them off.

GRIEF IN OGDEN.

They went to Ogden and early came to grief. In Ogden they were joined by a feilow named Clark. The first trick they turned resulted in the arrest of Clark who was promptly given \$200 or 200 days in jail. The others of the gang were fined \$100. Clark's friends paid his fine and he came to Salt Lake and took rooms at the Cullen. Not being on the inside Clark has to date refrained from operating in this city.

Together with the O'Briens he operated at the old stand, 223 south West Temple He did the steering work and soon had a "sucker" nibbling on the tabernacle block. He was taken to the room and relieved of \$95 and a diamond stud in a nice. quiet, gentlemanly way. Wilson was in on this game and held the hand that raked in the pot. The victim promptly reported his loss to the po-

Detective Shannon was "put to ork" on the case and gathered in Goldstein. Together they went over to the police station.

HAD "SETTLED."

When Goldstein returned Mrs. Peterson says he told her that HE HAD SETTLED THINGS FOR \$25 WITH THE SUCKER, AND THAT THE POLICE WOULD NOT BOTHER HIM. LICE WOULD NOT BOTHER HIM.

Mrs. Peterson says that the police came time and time again to see the O'Briens and it became common talk that the gang was fleecing strangers and enjoying police protection.

In brief, at the conclusion of this interesting story, if Mrs. Peterson is to be believed, Chief of Police George Sheets has been aware right along that there has been a gang of confidence crooks working in Salt Lake fleecing strangers since last May, at least. WHY DID HE NOT ARREST THEM?

PUBLIC PROTECTED.

Kentneky Racing Law Declared Constitutional in Circuit Court.

Cincinnati. Oct. 2.—The Kentucky rac-ing commission law was declared consti-tutional and the information against the racing commission was dissolved and the case remanded to the lower cout for fur-ther proceedings by the United States cuproceedings by the United States cu-court of appeals in this city today decision was, announced by Judge

The decision was announced by Judge Cochran.

The last legislature passed what is known as the racing commission law, the purpose being to avoid conflicting dates on tracks at the same place and to limit racing in general so as to avoid too leng meetings at any one point. The Douglas Park track at Louisville brought suit against the members of the racing commission individually to restrain them from preventing the holding of a race meeting against the members of the racing commission individually to restrain them from preventing the holding of a race meeting during the time set for a rival track. The lower court granted the injunction and the case was at once appealed. This injunction was today dissolved and the law declared to be constitutional.

Judge Cochran said that the whole case turned on the question of the public welfare. Where a business may be lawful, the enforcement of limitations may be harmful to some one engaged in that business, but the point of public welfare would have to govern. He discussed at some length the evils arising from betting on races and the maintenance of pool rooms in connection with the business, holding that some limitation was proper and necessary and that this porticular law was entirely fair to all concerned Even a law prohibiting the holding et some races would be valid of account of the evils of noolrooms, and certainly a law limiting the meetings would be according to public policy.




