

## JEFFS READY TO FIGHT RIGHT MAN.

Another Contest for the Heavy-Weight Championship is Badly Wanted.

### WHAT THE BIG FIGHT SAYS.

He Issues a Sweeping Challenge to Any and Every White Man in The Pugilistic Business.

During the past week there has been considerable talk in the local press to the effect that Jim Jeffries had at last been induced to consider a match with Jack Johnson, the big, clever colored fighter. But it appears that those who started the story spoke without authority from the champion. The other day he made a statement which he believes should be taken for all time to come his position in the matter. He declares that he is ready and willing to meet any white man in a championship fight, that it is an old story, but he will never fight Johnson, because of the latter's color. Here is the statement made by Jeffries:

I have said so often that I am ready to meet any white man in the world in a championship fight, that it is an old story, but I have to repeat it here. The faster they come, the bigger and cleverer they are the better I will be pleased.

There have been so many challenges hurled at me lately that it would seem that I ought to be able to get busy pretty soon, but I do not feel very hopeful. Any number of people are ready to challenge me when the time comes to make good, they advise.

All any man that wants a fight with me needs do is show me where he will be in the contest and that he is capable of putting up a real fight. I do not want to meet a fellow who is a light-weight, but I will do so. A fight with a man of Murren's caliber hurts the game. Whenever a man like the mine is touted as a world-beater and they make a show of showing pugilism to a number of friends. Another fight like that would put me on the brink of a drawing card.

In the last few weeks every man in the fighting game that weighs anywhere near the poundage mark has had a desire to challenge me. Not only have fighters come after me, but even amateur athletes have come to the front and promised to kill me with a blow. All this talk makes me long for a real fight, but I can't get it. I am a real fighter, and I am willing to give me a good fight. When that man shows up I'll crawl through the ropes and do the best I can to defend the championship.

As matters now stand I do not see that there is a man in the fighting business who has a right to meet me. Of course there are several who would take a licking for a small end of a big purse, but that's not the sort of a fight I want. I want a man who is a real fighter, and I want a man who is as good as I am. Now to get down to business. This is my challenge to the world. I will take each man by himself.

Ralph Rose - This fellow is a big kid. I thought at first that he was on the level and that he might really be small enough to meet me. He was as good as a lion when he first showed that he was strong enough to break my neck with a punch. He also had me faded in several other matters, notably speed and youth. As soon as I let it be known that I would be glad to do it, he was crawling over me. I hear he has a greater reputation for shooting off his mouth than for anything else. I am sure that he is not a man, and I am sure that he is not a man. No chicken-hearted man ever won a fight.

Tom Jenkins - No, Jenkins' proposition for a rough-and-tumble fight looks good to me. If he can prove that people will pay to see mix things on an evening, I will go back and can give him the fight he can be pulled off. I will take him on. As I figure it, he would not be very long. He hopes to win, and I will make a wrestling match of the bout, but I think I'd catch him coming, and if I did I'd knock him out. I don't want to knock Jenkins' proposition, for he may see his way to pulling the bout off, and I'm willing to do my share of the building.

Sandy Ferguson - All this fellow has to do is demand for a fight on the level, that he has beaten Gus Rubin and a few third and fourth rates. He doesn't class, and a fight with him would be a disgrace. I do not think he is a man, and he is willing to meet six men of his capacity in an evening.

Jack Johnson - This fellow is a fair fighter, but he is black, and for that reason I will never fight him. If I were not the champion I would as soon meet a negro as any other man, but the title will never go to a black man. I can help it. I do not think this fellow has anything on a lot of heavies that I have killed. He's a good man, but not as good as Fitz and Sharkey. He is an insufferable fellow, and has some queer ideas in his head. But the only thing that makes a fight with him impossible is that he is a negro.

Bob Fitzsimmons - Lately he has been talking lately about being ready to do it. He knows he don't want to meet me. I am talking for advertising purposes, and every talk brings results at the box office of his show.

I think I have very fairly sized on the men who say they want to fight me. I would like to see any one of these fellows take to the wall and let them see a set of articles within a mile of them. If any of 'em can be made fit opponents for me, and the public doesn't like that I fight them, I am ready. I am anxious to work at my trade-fighting-but there is nothing doing.

### STATEMENT BY MCLOSKEY.

Boise Manager Has Few Words to Say About His Claims.

With reference to the recent suit filed by Manager McCloskey of the Boise baseball team against the directors of that club, the Boise Statesman has the following to say:

Manager McCloskey stated last night that he attached the guarantee fund of the Boise club, held by President Lucas in Spokane, both as a protection to himself and to the club.

"The club owes the players considerable money. There may be other claims. As I was the highest bidder of the club I attached the money to protect myself and to prevent complications by possible numerous suits. I have allowed the club the use of the greater part of my salary, not fearing that the players should have it. That is the reason I have so much coming out of the club will pay every dollar it owes."

The management of the Boise Baseball club, managed by C. C. Cay, is anxious to straighten out the business affairs of the association. The season proved decidedly unprofitable and the Boise club is confronted with a deficit of \$120. This amount is owing the players for salaries. Should the stockholders turn in their assessments the sum required will be paid as the club will draw down its forfeit of \$1,000 which can be applied on the deficit.

The disastrous outcome of the league season is due to the lack of patronage in Butte and Salt Lake. For one game in Butte the attendance was less than 500. Last year Butte turned out an average attendance of nearly 1,000 to the game. This season the Butte club felt badly. The early and the public refused to support it. The same conditions prevailed in Salt Lake.

As a matter of fact, Boise patronized the game better than any city in the league, not even excepting Spokane. Visiting clubs received more money here than elsewhere.

The players have waited patiently for their money and believe it will be forthcoming directly the affairs of the club are put in shape.
