The board arranged for the sending out to the various newspapers throughout the 16 arid states the data which they will be requested to publish.

Shurtliff submitted a communication to the board advising them that their request for the use of the Ogden tabernacle for the holding of the congress had been granted, and the board appropriated \$150 for the decoration of the building suitable for the oc-

Mr. McKay also reported that State Engineer Doremus had been invited to inspect the state school for the deaf and blind grounds for the purpose of obtaining his opinion as to the propose of out tion to use the grounds for the irriga-tion exhibit and that he had looked over the ground.

A report was read from Mr. Doremus stating that the ground will make an excellent exhibit with some improve-ments and recommended that \$11,000 be appropriated for the making of the improvements. The board appropriated the requested amount for the nurness the requested amount for the purpose of placing the grounds in a proper con-dition for the exhibit.

The secretary was authorized to em-ploy extra clerical help. The board decided that at the next

meeting the special order of business will be the arranging of the congress proposed.
