

Secretary Taft's Mission To The Philippines.

His Visit to Manila is Officially One of Ceremony, the Occasion Being the Opening of the Assembly, the First Beginnings in Actual Parliamentary Government in the Islands—The Great Central Issue of Politics in the Islands is Independence—The Politicians Simply Agitators.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 16.—Years must run beyond a half-decades in any city before reconstruction or new construction makes radical changes. Except in new settlements, created out of nothing by a rush of population, as in Oklahoma nearly 20 years ago, and in Nevada gold fields later, this is true the world over. It is true of Manila, especially. Secretary Taft is not seeing much in the Philippine capital which he did not find there 10 years ago.

Malacañan Palace is the fashionable boulevard and residence district. The governor's palace, or residence, is still the broad and spacious but not luxurious mansion. Ermita is still the section preferred by American residents. The native city, the business and social center, is still the place of the other public buildings, the churches and the bawdier houses, and is still avoided by the wealthier residents.

Tondo retains its crowds of plain, unadorned houses, though it does not lack its grandiose individualities. Blasiano and San Nicolas are thick with Chinese. Luneta is the driveway along the beach where all classes who can muster equipages find their recreation and where those who cannot afford carriages flock to look on and take part in social relaxation.

THE SUMMER CAPITAL.

Baguio—the name means "wind"—is situated in the mountains north of Manila, and is now. It was selected in Taft's headquarters. Government must process its work, if it is to do steam and stills on the coast. Pusan connected with an American government must work at what a tropical seaport calls unnatural speed. So, it seemed economically better to have a working headquarters, not simply a holding headquarters, in the hills.

But all the Americans in the Philippines were finding time to make their acquaintance. To have a government at work during the hot months a road must be built. It was built. The money was well invested.

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The secretary will see and do a great deal more actual business there than at Manila.

WHAT AMERICANS ARE DOING.

Americanization of the Philippines does not exploit itself in decorating. It is operating chiefly in building railroad and irrigation works over the islands. It is found in the construction of docks and buildings for the naval depot at Olongapo. It is most strikingly, perhaps, visible in the groups of law structures which mark the great military post at Fort McKinley, outside of Manila, the most extensive army station owned by the United States.

There are three causes of slow pace in the outward civic betterment of Manila. One is that, at first, available money is far better expended in other directions. Another is that the Philippines, including Manila, are centers of mineral power. A third is told—the tropes do not call for stately edifices, and Manila is in the earthquake zone which belts the Pacific.

Once the story goes, the rich people of Manila had a fast for fine residences and business properties. An end came when they up, and the fast was laid aside forever, as far as native aspiration went. Nor do the easily discouraged Filipinos forget that a typhoon may happen along the next day.

Anything resembling American city building must be sought in railroad stations, powerhouses, ice-making plant and warehouses. Nor are they of the extraordinary. They are what immediate demands of American occupation and American industrial beginnings required.

If there could be a theater, calculated for a thousand spectators, the question of whether the capitalists intended might afford a splendid building. At that, it might be discovered that the Filipino masses prefer sternly to carry their birds around under their arms and get their sport with more intimate and friendly chance to jostle.

For architecture the visitor must still ask for the cathedral and some of the churches and convents. The hotels are as far from being skyscrapers—again space and air are the objects—as their kitchens are from affording either plenty of variety or enthusiasm of preparation. Manila is still Manila, and the Filipinos are waiting for Americans to do things.

Secretary Taft's party should be having good weather. It is the pleasant season—something like our middle state Septembers. The hot months come later, and the rainy season when we have summer.

ONE OF CEREMONY.

Secretary Taft's mission to the Philippines is officially one of ceremony. The occasion is the opening of the assembly, the first beginnings in actual parliamentary government in the islands.

There is also an element of deep emotion, because it is the return of a big man of democratic training, who was compelled to be the center of a paternal government during the years when he was the head of United States authority, and has been in touch, while he has been there, with his friends in America. Washington, returning with comrades, pupils and admirers, for the whole population regard "Santo Taft" as their patron and sympathetic friend.

This assembly constitutes a limited representative government, with such authority over local affairs as may fit the government of the United States under his advice regard as practicable at this period.

The great central issue of politics in the Philippines is independence. The politicians are really agitators. Few of them have had any experience even in the sort of direction of affairs so they can understand. They are talkers. All of them are patriots of one variety or another.

It has been aptly said in the Philippines that patriotism under different names and in different degrees of sincerity, all comes under the formula, "Just add heat and water." Give a Filipinos steamer a specific matter of taxation or administration, and he will wave his aside as a small detail, proceeding at once to brilliantly sum up dissertation on the great principles of government.

How this parliamentary body will attempt the actual business of government is a matter which is regarded by most American residents with amusement, with serious expectation only by those who believe in the personal influence of Governor Taft and the duration of the lessons which lie short visit.

LIBERTY AT ONCE.

Overwhelmingly the majority of the assembly consists of Nacionalistas. This group is composed of several others, which have grown up from time to time, but all animated by the principle of freedom from the control of the United States at the earliest possible moment.

The principal element of the minority

is composed of Progressistas. This may be called the temperate and moderate body. Its members profess the Taft idea of gradual approach to independence through a course of training in citizenship and industrial development, rather than full independence. These are not organized in a party, but hold themselves as free lance, ready to take any position that seems good to them on each question as it arises.

Some of the members of the Assembly have had experience as provincial governors or provincial officials, but most of them have no practical knowledge of affairs here, with the exception of a disciplined discussion to which the Philippine takes as a duck to water. One of the prominent candidates for the speakership is Pedro Paterno, probably the most distinguished and popular assemblyman.

In the time which separates Philippines from the rest of the world, the natives call Manila is still the place of the other public buildings, the churches and the bawdier houses, and is still avoided by the wealthier residents.

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
