Visitors from Boxelder county report that 40 to 60 per cent of the tomato crop between Willard and Brigham City has been ruined by blight, which destroys the plants as well as the vegetable. This will have a bad effect on the local canneries. The action of this blight is much like that of the pear blight.

It is the intention of James H. Anderson and his associates to construct a reservoir with a capacity of 500,000 gallons in connection with the waterworks plan for Bingham Junetion and Sandy. Plans for the reservoir are now being drawn and the enterprise will be pushed along as fast as possible. A franchise for a pipe line below the two towns has been granted to Mr. Anderson by the county commissioners.

PIONEER WOMAN DIES.

Wife of Bishop Harrison Sperry Succumbs to Lingering Affliction.

A Pioneer whose best days were spent ncouraging the settlement and cultivation of this valley, passed peacefully away at 5 o'clock last night, when the spirit of Susan Mosley Sperry, wife of Bishop Harrison Sperry of the Fourth ward, took its flight. Mrs. Sperry had

been ailing for more than a year, but her lilness did not become serious until gix weeks ago, when she was forced to take to her bed with the affliction which terminated in her death. The deceased was born at Nauvoo.Ill. Oct. 11, 1845, and came to Utah in September, 1848, one year after the arrival of the Pioneers. She endured with patience and fortitude all the hardships incident to Pioneer life, and at critical times assisted materially in overcoming obstacles common to early days in this valley. She married Bishop Sperry in February, 1861, and was the mother of 10 children, eight of whom, six sons and two daughters, survive her. For a number of years she was president of the Fourth ward Relief society, a position which she filled with honor and credit until three months ago, when she was forced to resign on account of failing health. She was a loving wife, a devoted mother and a faithful Latterday Saint, and her death is mourned by a wide circle of relatives and friends.
