


Weekly Weather and Crop Report United States department of agriculture, Idaho section, climate and crop service, weather bureau:

Continued absence of precipitation is resulting in a rapid failing off in the flow of streams, and in a number of canals there is not sufficient water for the acreage covered, but, as a rule,


