She left the east and middle east with and arrived in Salt Lake valley in the summer of 1847, being a member of Jedediah M. Grant's company.

On April 5, 1849, she was married to John S. White, a member of company C. Mormon Battalion. Mr. White enlisted at Council Bluffs, Iowa, in July, 1846, and with 500 others, made the memorable march across the continent to settle the claims of this nation against Mexico. Sister White was born Aug. 30, 1832,

and had she lived until Aug. 30, ne.ct, would have been 72 years of age. She was a native of New York City. Her husband was born just across the bay in New Jersey. She was baptised when a child and became a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints at the time her father, Addison Everett, presided over the New York branch. She has had il children, and is survived by her hus-band, who is 85 years of age, eight children, 69 grandchildren and 20 great-

Major by Apostle Wilford Woodruff, the fruits of this union being 11 children, 10 of whom, 5 boys and five girls, are still living, the youngest being 12 years of age; in 1876 she moved to Kaysville, and 10 years later took up her residence in East Bountiful. In 1892 the family moved to Layton, and when that ward was organized she was appointed president of the Relief society, a position which she filled with marked ability till 1900, when she moved with her husband and children to Thatcher, Arizona. At the latter place she was associated in the presidency of the Re-lief society of the ward, and an aid in the stake presidency. After living in Arizona for two years she returned to Layton, where she resumed her activity in the Relief society and other or-

ganizations in the ward, until her death which occurred April 18, 1904. Deceased was a thorough Latter-day Saint, and in her life she exemplified the teachings of her divine Master, and lived them out as she understood them. She fed the hungry, nursed the sick and comforted the distressed, and no one ever appealed to her in vain for help that was in her power to give; no mat-ter what the hour of the night, the condition of the weather or the dis-tance, she was always ready to respond. Notwithstanding her activity in re-ligious work, she was a model wife and mother, and the home over which she presided was a home in all that the name implies. In her devotion to others, she frequently forgot her own comfort and welfare. Though a great sufferer at times, she never murmured or complained, and when the end approached she showed the sementalists. proached, she showed the same patience and fortitude which had characterized her whole life, and surrounded by hus-band, children and friends, her gentle spirit took its flight, and a noble woman passed from the cares and sorrows of mortality to the life beyond.
