Interurban Lines Will Connect All Sections of Weber County With Junction City.

GOV'T FOREST SUPPLIES.

To Be Purchased from Western Merchants and Dealers-Robbers Identified and Confess.

Ogden, March 15 .- Ogden is enjoying the greatest interprban railroad building boom in its history. Before the end of six months almost every district in Weber county will be connected with Ogden by electric lines of the Ogden Rapid Transit company and within 45 minutes of Salt Lake City by the Bamerger electric line.

This morning witnessed more men at work on the interurban lines than ever efore, and the noise of the blast, the ginding of the steam shovel, the scrapg of the graders and the clang of the pike hammers is now a sound one will our for several months. The opera-

light for several months. The opera-tions that have opened up are the elec-triffication of the Bamberger road in the city, the building of the overthead crossing of the road over the Union Pa-cific tracks; the grading for the Plain City-Harrisville extension and 100 men grading, blasting and building cement rotatining walls for the trolley lines through Ogden canyon. The work that has been thus far ac-complished in Ogden canyon by the Rapid Transit company under Engineer Joseph A. Weat, since Novomber, is un-believable. Beginning at the mouth of the canyon the company has blasted away several thousand yards of rock in making way for their line as well as widening the county road. Along the side of the first bridge in the canyon two carloads of coment have been used in building concrete retaining walls two carloads of cement have been used in building concrete retaining walls and abutments for a steel bridge. Near this point, east of the bridge, the com-pany has cut away a concrete forma-tion that has always been dangerous for vehicles and automobiles in pass-ing and has made the wagon read about 70 feet wide, or about 40 feet wider than it was.
