The majority of the court cited, particularly, the following case:

"In Blue v. Beach, 56 N. E. Rep. 89, It appears that under a general statute requiring the board of health to adopt by-laws to prevent the spread of contagious diseases, and where it also ap-peared that smallpox epidemic was threatened, the local board of health made an order requiring that no un-vacefinated child be allowed to attend the public schools during the mean the public schools during the prevalence of the disease. It was held that an unvaccinuted child was properly excluded during that time, although it was and healthy, and had never been ex-

But the minority of the court made this reply, which covers the ground completely:

"Among those cited is the case of Blue vs Beach, 56 N, E, \$7, In that case the court says: 'It is true, beyond con-troversy, that the legislative depart-ment of the State, wherein the consti-tution had lodged all legislative power, will not be permitted to relieve itself of this power by the delegation thereof. It cannot confer those any hady on of this power by the delegation thereof. It cannot confer upon any body or person the power to determine what the law shall be, as that power is one which only the legislature, under our constitution, is authorized to exercise; but this constitutional inhibition can-not properly be extended so as to pre-vent the grant of legislative authority to some administrative board or other tribunal to adopt rules, by-laws, or or-dinances for its government, or to car-ry out a particular purpose.

But the dissenting judge showed that this power is not delegated to boards of health in this State and therefore it was exercised without authority of law. He said further:

Therein is the danger of such decisions as that rendered by the majority of the court. It not only threatens in the particular direction indicated, but in other ways. Granting undefined powers in irrespinable appointed boards is a menace to the liberties of citizens. It is a movement in the direction of absolutism and oppression. It is contrary
