NEGRO SHOT AND KILLED.

OGDEN, May 17.—Charles Staples, the aggro who was shot by Clarence Ernst, another negro, Saturday night, died at the hospital Sunday morning at 5 o'clock. The body was removed to the Larkin undertaking parlors, where it was viewed by Coroner J. D. Murphy and a jury composed of Joseph Ruffa, and a jury composed of Joseph Rulla, George D. Folkman and Chaude V. Zinn. After an examination of the gun-shot wound an adjournment was taken in the hearing until today. Staples was being sought after by the police when he was killed. He was

alleged to have been connected with George Cotter and Henry Weaver, two negro pickpockets who were arrested Saturday afternoon at the racetrack. Ernst, who conducts a pool room and cigar store on Lincoln avenue, had been requested by the officers to advise them if Staples went to Ernst's place and started disturbing the peace. Ernst went for the police and returned to the place accompanied by Jailor Hagbert Anderson.

bert Anderson. Finding that Staples had left Ernst's place Officer Anderson started for a negro saloon on Twenty-fifth street. Ernst left his place and started over to Lincoin avenue when, it is alleged. Staples stepped from behind a tree and contronted him. Ernst drawing a .38 callber revolver warned the man not to come near him. Staples without heed-ing the man advanced toward him and the latter fired. the latter fired.

Ernst immediately gave himself up to the police and the injured man was taken to the police station and then to the hospital. Drs.
