## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Work Stopped**—At the request of the city engineer work is stopped on the Washach drive until the bridges contemplated by the city are built.

**Fall Was Fatal**—George Bogos, an employee of the Lagoon, fell from a train the other night, and fractured his skull, from the effects of which he has since died.

**Camp Equipage**—The state quartermaster will make a requisition for \$4,000 worth of camp equipage from the government for use of the state troops at the Fort Riley encampment.

**How They Will Go**—The Elks will go to Denver, over the route, and return via the other, making it an even thing all around. But just what route they will take going east, is not settled.

**Committee Meet**—The executive committee of the D. A. & M. society and the Real Estate and M. & M. associations are meeting this afternoon to consider the matter of a joint exhibit.

**Senator Smoot Writes**—Senator Smoot has written a letter to the Real Estate exchange giving more in detail the facts relative to the status of Fort Douglas, and asking for a large garrison stationed there at no distant day.

**Preparing for Outing**—The Y. M. C. A. scholars are preparing for an outing next month at Bear Lake, and it is expected that over 40 of the boys will go. They propose to have a great time.

**Money Subscribed**—It is believed now that the \$20,000 necessary to firmly establish the Canyon Creek ranch will be raised in 10 days. Col. E. A. Wall, W. S. McCormick, M. H. Walker, W. S. Dickson, L. S. Hills, J. A. Greenwald, E. B. Jones and Jacob Morris were yesterday's contributors.

**Convention Postponed**—The annual convention of the National Hotel Men's association that was to have been held at Portland, has been called off at far as Portland is concerned, and will be held later at Chicago. Salt Lake was on the itinerary, and it would have been a good thing for the town could the members of the association have come west to stop off at this point.

**Got 30 Days**—Harry McCloud appeared before Judge Whitaker in the city court yesterday and pleaded guilty to petit larceny and was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail. McCloud was charged with trying to pass a \$100 bill, but the evidence was rather weak in that case. He was induced to plead guilty to another charge of petit larceny against him and the more serious charge will be dismissed.

**Chance for Job**—There will be a civil service examination in this city, for the position of topographical draftsman, June 27, for service in the department of construction and engineering, on the isthmus of Panama, at salaries of \$100 or \$125 a month, the usual entrance salary being \$100 a month. Age limit, 20 to 45. There will also be a civil service examination, same date, for the position of aid, on the Coast and Geodetic survey, at \$720 per month; age limit, 18 to 25.

**Mr. Campbell Declines**—A committee from the Federation of Labor waited on Manager Campbell of the Utah Light and Railway company, in the interest of the Street Railway union, but Mr. Campbell declined to entertain any proposition from a foreign organization. He says it is a question whether or not the system shall be operated by contract with an outside organization, and it is not the policy of the company to allow of anything of this kind.

**Waived Hearing**—Before United States Commissioner Charles Baldwin, yesterday afternoon Henry C. Harrison arrested some days ago for an alleged federal offense. The defendant waived examination and furnished bonds in the sum of \$1,000 for his appearance at New Orleans in November next. M. E. Mulvey and James McConery are his bondsmen. The offense of which Harrison is charged is that of sending through the mails certain matter pertaining to insurance, contrary to the provisions of the Federal statutes.

**Fillings for Water**—The following fillings were made yesterday afternoon, with the state engineer for water: V. C. Ward and R. M. Johnson of New York, 2,000 second feet of water from the San Rafael river in Emery county, to irrigate 60,000 acres with irrigable canal 11,000 feet long; Jacob J. Killian, Alma Lish, W. J. Farr and Eph Rasmussen of Vernal, eight second feet of water from Green river in Uinta county, to irrigate 600 acres; the Goodman Cattle company, John Goodman and Julius Paul of Knight, Wyo., 20 second feet of water from Great river in Summit county to irrigate both in Utah and Wyoming; John P. Sorenson of Salt Lake, 100 second feet of water from the Jordan river for irrigation. The point of diversion is designated as being near the center of the northeast quarter of section 27, in township 1 north, range 1 west. The water is to be diverted by means of a pumping plant and with a part of two townships of land are to be irrigated.

# BUSINESS MEN FILE A PROTEST

Are Not Satisfied With Administration's Lack of Care Of Streets.

## DUST DOING MUCH DAMAGE.

Squabble Over Appropriation of \$225 For Purchase of Horse and Buggy For Chief Inspector.

That the business men of this city, especially on East Temple street, are not satisfied with the manner in which the present administration is taking care of its streets and sprinkling them is very evident from a petition which was sent to the city council last night. The petition, or rather, protest, was signed by 100 business firms on the street calling attention to the fact that East Temple street is not properly sprinkled. The petitioners suggest that both sides of the street be sprinkled at the same time and much more often than at present. The dust on the street is now doing damage to the stocks of the merchants, and is a great inconvenience and annoyance to them and to the public in general. The matter was referred to the street sprinkling committee with instructions to act at once.

## GETS HORSE AND BUGGY.

There was somewhat of a discussion over the report of the committee recommending the appropriation of \$225 for the purchase of a horse and buggy for the use of the chief inspector of the board of public works. Martin and Ferguson strongly opposed the matter and contended that the city should put a stop to that matter some time. Martin said that if there was too much work for the inspector to do under the present system he had better quit and the city could employ some one else. Ferguson said that it would be a heavy expense, as the city would have to feed the horse and buggy long when it could not be used by the inspector at all. He thought it was time the city should stop buying rigs for its employees to drive down to Liberty park on Sundays to the band concerts. The report was finally adopted by a vote of 10 to 3.

## MORE MONEY GOES.

A resolution was adopted allowing the health commissioner \$25 per month for feed for his horse. It was claimed by Ferguson that the former health commissioner was allowed the \$25 per month extra for board for his horse in lieu of an assistant commissioner, whereas now the commissioner has an assistant and gets the \$25 too.

## CLAIM OF \$100.

A claim was submitted from Rosalie M. Quibby asking for damages in the sum of \$10,000 for personal injuries received on the night of June 5 by falling into an excavation on Third West street near 21st North. The petition stated that the claimant is over 60 years of age, and that the excavation was placed in the street by the Oregon Street Light and Water company, and was left unguarded or without signal lights. In addition to the injuries to her back, sides, hips and limbs she claims that the excavation was full of water and she was struck and as a result she has been seriously afflicted with rheumatism ever since the accident. The matter was referred to the committee on claims with the city attorney associated.

## TWO MORE CLAIMS.

Mrs. Anna Behle of 729 South State street presented a claim of \$150 for damages to her premises caused by the street car company. She claims that the water flooded her premises because the streets and gutters were not properly graded. The claimant committee will consider this matter.

A similar claim for \$500 damages was received from E. R. Hingley and L. Correll, residing at 113 and 115 East 1st North street. They claim that the ground floors of their homes were flooded by the water and their furniture was greatly damaged. The claim was referred to the same committee.

## WILKINS TURNED DOWN.

Upon recommendation of the finance committee, the council rejected the claim of W. H. Wilkins for \$200 for services as clerk of the board of public works. Mr. Wilkins was removed by the new administration on April 2, but he claims that his removal was illegal and hence he wants the salary connected with the office. He has presented a bill for two months' service, which was rejected.

The council decided to put in a large water connection from the city's rights to the Warm Springs property, so that the trees on that property may be kept in good condition. The lawn and grove will be thrown open to the public and will be used for the purpose of a park in that part of the city.

## CONTRACT APPROVED.

The contract with Hensley & Ritchie for the construction of the new bridge over City creek on the line of the Washach boulevard was approved by the council. The contract price is \$913. The contract also provides for the work with W. B. Black for the construction of four lavatories at Liberty park at a cost of \$2,581.

## ORDINANCE INTRODUCED.

An ordinance was introduced and referred to the municipal laws committee granting a franchise to the Rio Grande Western Railway company to construct a spur track across the city from the intersection of the main line between Fifth and Sixth streets and Fifth West between Sixth and Seventh streets.

Walker Brown will probably be required to give the railway leading from the basement under the bank, back to the four-foot limit as provided by ordinance. The railway now takes up more than 100 feet of the sidewalk, whereas the law only allows four feet. The streets committee will investigate the matter.

## CHICAGO ARCHITECT HERE.

L. H. Sullivan to Consult on Proposition of Erecting Big Hotel.

Architect L. H. Sullivan arrived from Chicago last evening, and is at the Knottford, having come west to consult with J. E. Dooly on the proposition to erect a hotel at the corner of First West and Second South streets, mention of which was made in the "News" two months ago. Mr. Sullivan said the plan included a hotel with 400 rooms, of steel construction. He is an enthusiast on steel construction, in view of the results from the San Francisco disaster, and sees no reason why sky scrapers should not be erected in this city as well as anywhere else, earthquake or no earthquake. Mr. Sullivan was the architect of the Dooly building in this city. He urges that smoke be allowed in Chicago there would be no living there.

Gen. Charles A. Coolidge, U. S. A., retired, now visiting at Fort Douglas, will be a guest of the club on this occasion. It is not generally known that the general is a graduate in medicine, an M. D. and therefore may be called Dr. Coolidge with perfect propriety. He took his degree in medicine in 1874 from the University of Wooster, Ohio, while he was a lieutenant in the Seventh Infantry, but he preferred to remain in the line to joining the medical staff of the army. However, if any of this evening's guests should be suddenly taken ill, it will not be necessary to phone for a physician, as Dr. Coolidge will be close at hand to furnish prescriptions and even perform amputations. If it is really absolutely necessary, the doctor entered upon his military service as a private in the Sixteenth Infantry in 1862, a regiment not so very long ago stationed at Fort Douglas and which furnished to Salt Lake society not a few many buds of promise. He was commissioned May, 1864, second lieutenant in "The Gallant Seventh" regiment and during a short absence as lieutenant colonel of the Ninth Infantry, was always with the Seventh until he substituted a star on his epaulettes in his shoulder straps. Gen. Coolidge retired three years ago. He was distinguished for bravery in the Indian wars.
