LOCAL BRIEFS.

Indiana's Fat Bank Account—Harry Harris, of the Indiana, has just deposited in the National Bank of the Republic, \$100,000 paid him by the government.

Thug's Victim Recovered—Mr. Burrows, the merchant who was brutally assaulted April 15, is well recovered, and his wounds are practically healed.

Odd Fellows Initiated—Twenty-five initiates were initiated last night at Odd Fellows hall into the Order of Moosewives, an organization bearing the same relation to Odd Fellows that the Shrine does toward Masons.

Look Bright For Speedway—At yesterday afternoon's annual meeting of the Salt Lake Automobile club, it was announced that the trouble in securing the needed property for the automobile right of way between this city and Saltair was being cleared up, and the roadway will be built.

Exhaustive Work—Prof. Marcus E. Jones of this city is completing an exhaustive work on botany which will cover about 1,600 species and which he has been working on for years. Prof. Jones is also completing a 700 page report on the botany of the northwestern Montana for the state university.

Seeking Opportunities—Letters are being constantly received at the headquarters of the Salt Lake Real Estate Association, asking for information about the city and state, and opportunities for business of various kinds. Secretary Perkins is sending out replies in circular letters, which is keeping him busy.

Breks Leg in Runaway—The horse of James Girard of 4156 Third East street, ran away on State street yesterday afternoon, throwing Mr. Girard from the wagon into a sand pile, breaking one leg and dislocating a knee. He was removed to his home in the paternal wagon and medical attention summoned.

Child Saved by Car Finder—The presence of mind of Jacob M. L. Richins of the Warm Springs Inn, one afternoon saved the two-year-old child of E. W. Merrill of 221 west First North street from being mangled under the car by the prompt dropping of the femur. The child was caught and carried for some distance before the car could be stopped and was removed unbruised.

Power Plant For St. George—A company has been organized in this city to finance the operation of electric power plant in St. George, with a capital stock of \$20,000, with shares at \$100 each, and these officers: President, A. H. Hansen, Vice President, George Z. Edwards, Secretary and Treasurer, R. J. Evans; Manager and Engineer, E. B. Slosson. It is expected to begin operations in six months.

Night Watchman Discharged—D. J. Whitmore, night watchman at the west side stockade, was tried before Justice of the Peace Stanley A. Banks yesterday afternoon on the charge of robbing an office. It was alleged that he interfered with deputy sheriff a month ago when they raided the place. It was shown, however, that Whitmore acted under a misapprehension of conditions. He was found not guilty and discharged.

Dibble Funeral Tomorrow—The funeral of Loren W. Dibble who died from injuries received by a fall in a Bingham mine, will be held tomorrow at 11 a. m., from J. W. Taylor's chapel, with interment in City cemetery. Alvin P. Dibble, the brother who was seriously injured of the same mine, still unconscious at the Keogh-McCormick hospital, Theta, died. Mrs. Nettie Dibble is at St. Mark's hospital where she went for an operation some days ago.

Mrs. Fiske to Address Women—Arrangements are being made by Mrs. Tom Pitt, state superintendent of the W. C. T. U. and Mrs. H. P. Myton, chairman of the women's committee of the Women's League, to hold a meeting of the two organizations early in June in the public library. Dr. Cooper, the wife of Wm. A. Fisher, the actress, and Judge W. H. King of this city, will speak on the need of humane education. The public will be invited to attend the meeting.

G. A. R. Flower Committee—An important meeting of the flower committee of the Women's citizen's committee of the G. A. R. encampment, will be held in the Commercial club building Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, when matters pertaining to the distribution of flower seeds will be considered. The members of the committee to which each section will also be attended to, and a full attendance of members or the committee is urgently requested.

Fivewater Statistics—Willie E. Johnson, chief special officer of the United States Indian service in Salt Lake City, has issued a table showing the convulsions secured during the month of March of this year, in the matter of the suppression of the liquor traffic among Indians. It is there shown that the total number of convictions secured during the month of March, 26 were in California, 129 in New York, 18 in Oklahoma, 13 in Nevada, one in Montana, two in Arizona and two in New Mexico.

Conflicting Messages—A mixed telegraph message caused a good deal of trouble yesterday afternoon, Frank G. Janney received a wire from Los Angeles stating: "Mother is dead—Lottie." At Mrs. Janney and daughter had gone to southern California some weeks ago for the former's health, the authenticity of the message was unquestioned, and Mr. Janney wired Mrs. E. M. Janney his sister-in-law, last letter to Los Angeles to bring home the body. After they had gone, Mr. E. M. Janney received a message stating Mrs. F. G. Janney was better, and the telegraph was at once called into requisition to bring F. G. Janney back.
