

relation to sealers of weights and measures; H. F. 91, to prescribe fees for secretary services. Also that \$10 be allowed to reimburse the sealer of weights and measures for fitting up the Territorial scales. Adopted.

The claims committee, by Mr. Penrose, reported adversely upon the claim of Theodore McKean, for relief for board and care of prisoners, received from the United States Marshal, as the Territory is not liable for the expense. Also that \$59 be appropriated to pay commissioners bill for records and blanks. The latter claim was allowed, and the former rejected.

The committee on municipal corporations and towns, reported favorably upon the passage of Salt Lake City charter. Also unfavorably upon the petition of William Lynch and 163 others, asking that a provision be made with new charter, just reported upon, for each precinct to elect its own municipal officers. Adopted.

The resolution appointing a committee concerning library documents was read and filed.

By permission, Mr. Thurman introduced a bill amending chapter 4, title 11, of the Compiled Laws, relating to foreign corporations doing business in this Territory. Read twice and filed.

The House took up the appropriations bill which was read. The following amounts are allowed for sundry claims and losses: John Turner, \$1,000; Ashton Nebeker, \$271.32; W. D. Johnson, \$47.38; J. W. Witt, \$30.85; L. Holbrook, \$60.25; G. Belknap, \$77.50; printing amendments to laws, \$65.50; jurors and witness fees, etc., \$20,000; J. H. Henderson, \$38.90; G. Spillsbury, \$40; Omaha Republican, \$26.95; R. Fry, \$40; J. E. Booth, \$800; J. T. Calne, \$600; Jesse W. Fox, \$400; James Jack, \$11.35; James Jack, \$75; G. M. Brown, \$150; J. Booth, \$100; offices of auditor and treasurer, \$500; James Jack, \$255.25; Joel Ricks, \$75; Deseret News, \$59; Geo. M. Brown, \$133.32; M. H. Peck, \$10. Total, \$24,815.52.

H. F. 85, the general appropriation bill, was read, showing a total already appropriated of \$131,340. Grand total, \$156,155.52. The latter bill was passed—ayes 21. Title approved.

The Council bill changing the boundary lines of Kane, Iron and Washington counties, and creating Snow County, was read. Kanab is made the county seat of Kane County; St. George county seat of Washington, Parowan the county seat of Iron, and Panguitch as county seat of Snow County. The bill passed—ayes 21. Title approved.

The Council passed a resolution (substitute for H. F. 72) to appoint a Territorial statistician to be appointed by each session of the Assembly who shall give bonds in the sum of \$5,000, and shall put himself in communication with all sources of information concerning agriculture, stock-raising, mining, manufacturing, exports, imports, immigration, social statistics and industrial enterprises, meteorology and such miscellaneous matters as he may deem of importance, arrange and publish in pamphlet form 5,000 copies of the same, 100 of which shall be retained for the use of the Assembly and the remainder distributed to the general public; \$2,500 is appropriated to defraying expenses and pay his services. The bill was read thrice under a suspension of the rules and passed—ayes 21. Title approved.

A communication from the Governor stated that the bill providing for the canceling of warrants and forbidding treasurers and collectors from purchasing warrants had been approved, and so also had the bill to change the name of Thomas E. Geuge to Thomas E. Gauge.

The Governor suggested a substitute for the bill providing for sealers of weights and measures which was read. The bill requires that all county sealers shall have their weights and measures gauged semi-annually by the Territorial sealer and that he shall that often inspect the weights and measures of millers, merchants, etc., and gauge them by his own. Another difference is that the Territorial sealer and not the county courts shall appoint deputies in the several counties. The bill passed—ayes 14, noes 7. Title approved.

H. F. 69, to establish and protect the maternal rights of married women was read. It is as follows: "That the rights of married parents as regards their children, shall be equal." The bill passed—ayes 18, noes 8. Title approved.

The Council resolution was read to appropriate \$1,000 to the assistance of the county courts of Sevier

and Piute Counties in the construction of a wagon road from Marysville, Piute County, following down the Sevier River to the mouth of Clear Creek, in Sevier County. The resolution passed—ayes 17, noes 4. Title approved.

Communications from the Governor announced his approval of the bill to amend section 181 of the Compiled Laws, and his disapproval of the bill appointing a committee to revise the laws of Utah. Also his disapproval of the bill to enforce the civil rights of the Territory, and suggested a substitute for the same if the House are determined upon such a measure.

The substitute was read and on motion the rules were suspended and the bill passed—ayes 20. Title approved.

The special order, the new charter of Salt Lake City, was taken up and read.

The claims committee, by Mr. Penrose, recommended that the following claims be allowed for certificates of service of jurors and witnesses: To O. J. Averill, \$1,109.30; to A. C. Emerson, \$230.50; to C. W. Emerson, \$80.15; and Benjamin Bachman, \$217.80. The various sums were ordered to be placed in the appropriation bill.

The joint resolution appointing a commissioner to collect and publish information relative to irrigation matters was read and passed—ayes 15. Title amended to read, "A resolution in relation to an irrigation commissioner."

The bill relating to costs in criminal cases was read. No property of a defendant, if he be found guilty shall be exempt from execution except his homestead and household furniture. If the defendant be discharged the expenses must be borne by the complainant, unless a satisfactory excuse is rendered to the Court. Passed—ayes 19. Title approved.

H. F. 91, defining the fees of the Secretary of the Territory in certain cases, was read. It empowers him to issue warrants, his fee for which shall be five dollars. He shall also take acknowledgments and administer oaths. Passed, ayes 20.

The bill to impose licenses upon certain professional and other occupations, was considered, but rejected on its passage—ayes 8, noes 13.

The House adjourned till 10 a. m. on Thursday.
