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MARVIN HART CAPTURES TITLE.

Sent Jack Root to the Mat for Keeps in Twelfth Round.

FOUGHT UNDER BLAZING SUN.

Chicago Man Was Put Out of Business By a Wallop in the Stomach.

Reno, Nev., July 3.—In a furious 12-round fight that was witnessed by an excited crowd of 5,000 people, Marvin Hart of Louisville knocked out Jack Root of Chicago here this afternoon, with odds 3 to 1 the other way.

The contest took place in the great arena a mile east of the city of Reno, and for nearly an hour the men fought under a blazing sun that was almost prostrating. The decisive blow was landed by Hart in the twelfth round.

Root, who was tired, but still fighting gamely, led hard for the head with his left hand as he missed. Hart sent a terrific right-hand blow to the pit of the stomach. The smack of the blow was heard all over the immense arena and when Root fell gasping for breath the spectators knew that he would never rise within the count.

NO COMPLAINT. "It was a square fight and I have no complaint to make," said Root, who was sitting on the ground, looking up at Hart. Hart announced that he stood ready to meet all comers, barring negroes. The fight opened with both men fighting desperately, Root smiling as Hart beat him every time they came together. Hart striking for the kidneys, while Root smashed at the stomach.

ALTIITUDE TROUBLED HIM. Root seemed to suffer most from the altitude breathing with his mouth open. He spat blood every time he went to his corner, having received several vicious blows in the mouth. Several times he was carried to the ropes by the furious rushes of Hart, who repeatedly lost his head during the fighting in the clinches and referee Jeffries was compelled to break them by main force.

At the close of the seventh round, when honors rested evenly, Hart dropped from a heavy right on the point of the jaw. The gong sounded before the blow was delivered, but no foul was allowed, as there was evidently no intention to violate the rules on the part of the Chicago man.

At the end of the tenth round there was no Root money in sight. Root fought valiantly, but his blows lacked steam and while he landed oftener than Hart it was apparent that he could never land a knockout.

Hart rushed his man at every opportunity, taking lefts and rights to the body in order to land on the heart and kidneys. Root clinched frequently and hung on to his opponent, but was easily until compelled to break.

Both men responded with a rush at the opening of the twelfth. Hart led first and forced the fighting, rushing Root almost into his corner, where he remained bludgeoned to the body. It was during the infighting that the knockout came and not until after Root recovered was its exact nature known, Root stating that it landed at the pit of the stomach.

Lon Houseman, manager for Root, stated that the blow was a "fluke" and said that Root would win in another fight. Up to this point of the fight Root had a commanding lead over his opponent and appeared to have the winning well in hand until finally floored.

The feature of the fight aside from the battle itself was the initial appearance of J. J. Jeffries, retired champion of the world, who acted as referee for which function the Los Angeles hotel-maker received \$1,000. Harry Corbett, the stakeholder, was at the bedside with the club's \$5,000 in his pocket, to be split on the basis of 25 per cent to the winner and 25 per cent to the loser.

The seconds of Jack Root were "Battling Nelson," Teddy Alexander and Paddy Mackey. Bill Gallagher of San Francisco held the watch for Root. The seconds of Hart were Jack M. Corbett, "Deary" Thompson, Jack Roberts, Hal Updike and Lee Updike. Time-keeper was Al B. Updike.

ROOT GOT THE SUN. In the choice for corners Jack M. Corbett, Hart's manager, beat Lou M. Houseman, acting for Root, and selected the corner placing his man's back to the glaring sun.

Among the celebrities at the ringside were Harry Corbett, Jack Welch, Billy McConnell, Bill Gallagher, Attorney General Sweeney of Nevada, Sam Davis, Lou M. Houseman of Chicago, Senator P. G. Newlands, Leonard Allen and wife of Nevada, H. L. Bagley, "Doc" Smith, Walter Young, Al North of Reno, Samuel Myers, Mayor O'Connor of Reno, Col. Martin Brady, Al Herford, Warden Considine of the Nevada penitentiary, Dan Newman, chief of Police of Washoe county, District Attorney Craig of Nevada and the entire constabulary and police arm of Washoe and the city of Reno.

JEFFRIES ANNOUNCES RETIREMENT. Before entering the ring Jim Jeffries waited upon both men and stated that he had retired for good from the ring, and that the winner of the fight is entitled to the title of "heavyweight champion of the world."

The following message was received by Jack Root from John L. Sullivan at Oakland, Cal.: "In case you win I shall challenge you from Reno to Reno a side bet."
