This dispatch appears to confirm reports from various quarters of a fresh attack on Port Arthur by the Japanese, The report reached Nagasaki from Cheefoo, and it adds that the Russian crews of the four torpedo boats have been transferred.

Baron von Sternberg Tells What Her Policy There Has Been.

TOUCHED ON THE PHILLIPINES.

Was Far Seeing Eye of Washington Government That Saved China from Dismemberment in 1900.

Philadelphia, Feb. 22 .- Baron Hernan Speck von Sternberg, the German ambassador to the United States, upon whom the University of Pennsylvala today conferred the degree of doctor of laws, was the principal speaker at the regular monthly meeting tonight of the American Academy of Political and Social Science at the New Century drawing room. A large audience warmly greeted the baron.

Baron von Sternberg, after referring at length to the part taken by German immigrants "in elevating the United States to its present greatness," concluded as follows: "It was not until the year 1884 that

the German empire, reunited and con-solidated by the genius of Bismarck, acquired foreign colonies. First in Africa, later on in the Pacific, where she possesses various island groups.

"In 1898 the Chinese port of Kiao Chou, wih a strip of hinterland in the province of Shan Tung, was added to Germany's foreign possessions and her latest acquisition of territory is the islands of Upolu and Savaii of the Samoan group, in 1899. You will remem-ber that these islands were governed by a condominium of three powers, the United States, Great Britain and Ger-many. Constant friction was the outcome of this form of government. Dur-ing the summer of 1898 the three pow-ers sent each a high commissioner to those unhappy islands with instructions to devise means to settle once and forever all strife and to establish there a stable government. It is chiefly owing to the ability and far-sightedness the American commissioner, Bartlett Tripp, that the vexed Samoan question was settled so quickly and in a manner acceptable and honorable to the three great and friendly nations.

"Time is too short for me to dwell on the history and development of Germany's colonies in Africa and in the Pacific, but I think it may be of inter-est to you to hear a few words about her Chinese possession. Kiao Chou, since the eyes of the world are turned toward the battleground in the far east where the greatest political and social problems which ever confronted the statesmen and the diplomats, domaant for centuries, are now ripe for solution. That the time was rapidly approaching was keenly felt by all students of the far east long ago. The powers of the world also foresaw long ago that to have a voice in the pending great councils of nations which should decide the

fate and future of China they, abov

The fundamental policy of Germany in the administration of her Chinese colony has given the greatest liberty to subjects of all nations and the main-tenance of the best public order. Hawaiian Fishing Claims.

San Francisco, Feb. 23 .-- Lorrin Andrews, attorney-general of Hawaii, has arrived here on his way to Washing-ton to argue the fisheries case before the United States supreme court, which the United States supreme court, which is expected to come up for hearing early in March. This case, involving rights valued at \$1.000,000 or more, arose from a provision of the act creating the ter-ritory ,that all claims to private rights to fish in the ocean adjacent to the isl-ands must be established by suit brought in circuit court. Several hun-dred suits were brought under the act, but by stipulation all of the plaintiffs will abide by the decision of the United States supreme court in the present case now on appeal. case now on appeal.
