Insertions and emplacements of handsome faces and embroideries are somewhat more favored in the new models than the hand embroideries, though some very beautiful and expensive models show lace insertions in conjunction with hand embroideries. The illustration shows the use of a real Valenciennes and Irish crochet lace with openwork embroideries attractively inset in a soft, sheer batiste. The yoke is of the batiste in tiny handrun tucks, the lower portion of the waist plain but much inserted with the lace and embroideries. The sleeve is the prevailing three-quarters length, the puff inserted with the Val lace, while the cuff is of the Irish crochet and Val, matching the collar, the frill of the batiste with Val edging. As in all these lingerie waists, the fastening is in the back, which has a group of fine tucks down either side of the closing. Many women are wearing these waists over delicately tinted China silk slips, which may be made at home or purchased ready made in the shops at very reasonable prices.
