the chief promoter of the scheme. His-plan is to use warm spring water, elec-tricity or gas to heat incubators for hatching purposes. From 15,000 to 15,000 eggs will go int othe machines at a time, and it is believed that at least 160,000 chicks could be secured, which as brotlers would bring a neat sum.

Mr. Beck thinks that his plan would revolutionize the egg and chicken business in Utah, and that in a very short time, this state would be in a position to ship vast quantities of poultry and eggs. in-stead of sending to other states for most of her supplies in these lines.
