HE WANTED A TREASURER.

When He Got His He Traveled His Cash and Took the First Train for the Coast.

A few trading teachers, J. P. Brunson by name, one morning during the latter half of last week returned to see a little "word" of the "Wanted" order in one of the News newspapers. It ran as follows:

He got the explanation in this way: The leading "theater" was the N. S. 201 S. 2nd street, where the writer at it was running. The latter's name was Robert Watson, alias P. A. Watson.

It was under the name of Watson that he had received Brunson. A contract between the two was the result of the meeting. It was signed and attested on Saturday. Under it Brunson had to pay a cash bond of \$50 and was to accompany Watson to San Francisco, where he was to act as treasurer of the "Wanted" Watson.

Brunson was to go for a week as a teacher, and after two weeks, but yesterday afternoon Watson packed up his meager belongings and took the 2:15 train for Ogden. About 3 o'clock Brunson received a note to the effect that Watson had gone ahead in the 2:15 train to make arrangements with a ticket broker for transportation generally for some of the members of the company, and arriving Brunson to follow on the train. Brunson, however, now commenced to open his eyes and scratch his head, and the wider he opened them and the harder he scratched, the more convinced he was that he had been duped, and he soon sought relief in a visit to the trouble in Ogden. He found that the result of it was that Watson was at Ogden, the officers there having been instructed by wire to perform that duty. When Brunson arrived at Ogden he found a railroad ticket to Auburn, California, in his possession.

This morning Watson was brought back to Salt Lake from the Junction City by Detective Alvin Paul. He was taken before Commissioner Pratt where he insisted a plea of not guilty to the charge of embezzlement. At the police station later in the day he said to a News reporter that he did not intend to attempt to defend himself and that he stood prepared to carry out his contract with him. He said also that there was no question but that he could prove his innocence.
