He advised the reading of the Scriptures in the homes of the people and thus inculcating in the hearts of the children love for the things of God.

Edder Morris said be doubted the purity of the national loyalty which seeks its own ends by rabbing the reservance when oppose. loyally which seeks its own ends by robbing the government when opportunity presents itself, as is being done in many places today. The government belongs to the people and they should be equally interested in having it strong and pure. When the president is placed temporarily at the head of the nation, it is through the voice of the people, who reign supreme.

Some people desire to avoid the pay-ment of taxes. That feeling is wrong, and people would do well to get away from that kind of loyalty. Some again think that loyalty is evidenced by a willingness to fight for one's country. A man may go to war actuated by a de-sire for romance, danger and other things, but loyally of the truest kind be shown by the woman who stays

at home.

The apathy of the people in these days in the exercise of the franchise was also referred to. Some will not go to vote unless a carriage is sent for them. Such an exhibition of loyalty is reprehensible. No one can be loyal to a man and do him evil, and those who do unrighteous things are not loyal to the party or government. It is a stupid thing to stand by the party whether right or wrong, and it is only a question of time before party politics must be remodeled. Some victories may be be remodeled. Some victories may be worse than defeat where they are galued by unrighteousness.

In conclusion, Elder Morris referred to loyalty to God, which consisted not alone in words, but by acts. The Savior said, "If ye deny me before men I will deny you before my Father in heaven." True loyalty to God consists in being honest and true with your fellow man, even to the payment of the street car fare. One's Integrity is worth more than money. We should be loyal to principle. Giving to God of our best efforts is loyalty in a higher degree. It is illustrated in the case of Cain and Abel, one of whom gave the best of the flocks and the other gave the poorest of the fruits of the field. Job was loyal to God under great trials. And after all God added many fold to him in blessings both temporal and Spiritual.



street.
