# EVENTS IN THE WEST.

A Record of Occurrences in Neighboring States and Territories.

## FIGHT FOR THE CLIPPERTON ISLAND.

Tortured by Masked Robbers—Cuddey in California—Construct the Nicaragua Canal—Miscellaneous.

Omaha Stockman, Feb. 9th. T. W. Peterson of Clifton, Utah, brought in four pairs of range cattle, W. L. White, a well known trader of this market, had six pairs of cattle here from Provo, Utah.

Simon Striver, the earliest discoverer of Santa Clara county, Cal., died Monday afternoon on his ranch two miles west of Irwin, after a protracted illness. He was nearly 70 years of age and had been failing for some time, but the immediate cause of death was acute pneumonia, which resulted from a cold.

At Pocatello, Ida., Monday, Walter Davis, an Oregon Short Line employe, met his death in a rather peculiar manner. Mr. Davis was using a tank on an engine tank, when the engine flew up and struck him a terrible blow on the head, killing him instantly. The deceased was 25 years of age and unmarried.

Deulah L. Pinion was found dead in her bed at a lodging house in San Francisco Monday morning by a land maker of the establishment. Chopped in her hand was an empty vial that had contained carbolic acid, and from the corrosive marks upon the young woman's face it was evident that she had employed that agent to end her life.

Michael Cuddey, the multimillionaire of Chicago, is in Los Angeles, Cal., making a tour of inspection of his interests in Southern California. Olinsky, who resides at 422 Occident street, was returning with his sisters, Dora and Lillian, from an entertainment when he was unfortunately run over by Thomas Kelly, special policeman for the John Street grammar school.

A holocaust occurred at Red Bluff, Cal., at 4 o'clock Monday, the fire of which was never seen before. It lasted but fifteen minutes, but in that short time it did much damage. It came from the north after a severe storm, which had prevailed during the forenoon. The fatalities were as follows: In the house, which fell with a rapidity and force that has never been equaled.

The sealer Kate and Anna, Charlie Lattich, meters, were taken from San Francisco December 10 under a sailing license. The act of Congress prohibiting sailors' trading was passed December 29 and the owners asked the treasury department whether the act would extend to the Kate and Anna. The department ruled that the vessel's license was no protection, but practically revoked by the act and all sailors captured by her will be condemned on her arrival.

News was received at San Jose, Cal., Monday of a fatal accident which occurred at Chualarville, a village near San Jose, on Saturday afternoon. A number of boys were playing with a toy pistol which one of them, but made. It was made of wood and to it was fastened a brass cylinder, which was filled with powder. When it was touched off the cylinder was driven backward and struck Ernest Carter, aged 13, above the right eye, entering the brain. The boy died half an hour.

Left Grant, an aged and well-to-do resident of Myrtle Point, near Marshfield, Oregon, was tortured by two masked robbers who, by repeatedly burning his bare feet in a hot stove, succeeded in extorting from the old man all he had on the premises. Grant told them he had no money, but the robbers were not satisfied and forthwith caught the old man and placed his feet in the stove, holding them there until he promised to divulge where his money was. The first time he gave the robbers \$10 but this was not sufficient, and they put him to the torture again and again, until they succeeded in obtaining \$10, after which they made their escape.

B. C. Thayer, a son of Ned Thayer, well known in political circles in Oakland, Cal., and the proprietor of a saloon on Eighth street, was shot and perhaps mortally wounded Monday. Thayer entered the gun store of Calvin M. Verrill, at 455 Broadway street, that morning, and asked to be shown some second-hand weapons, as he wanted to purchase a revolver. Mrs. M. Alexander, Verrill's daughter, seated upon the young man and showed him the stock on hand. In the course of his inspection she noticed a new all-weather section of the building partly from a white cord, and in order to demonstrate its efficiency, lifted the trigger and snapped it down again, with her arm extended well across the counter toward her customer. There was an explosion, and Thayer staggered to the door and then fell screaming to the floor. He had been shot in the left side, and physicians believe now that the wound is a mortal one.

By a set of untoward circumstances, transpired lately in his intermittent love for liquor, Ira N. Tuck, at one time a leader of philanthropic moves, made in Denver, Colo., is locked up in the city prison, San Francisco, on a charge of having obtained by false promises two times valued at \$100 from Schumacher & Co.'s store. He was arrested late last Friday night by Detective Cady and Bitter and kept confined in the tank until Monday morning. Tuck, whose father, but at one time an assiduous and competent man of business, the latest position he held in Denver was that of promoter for the Colorado Paving company. He had previously been employed for a number of years in the claims department of the Union Pacific, Denver and Gulf Railway company, and was at one time a man of comparative wealth. In Chief Lee's pension now are letters from Manager Warren of the Colorado Paving company, which give Tuck an excellent character as a business man.

San Francisco, Feb. 10.—The question of the national sovereignty in which Clipperton island belongs, will be presented to Judge Lowell at San Francisco in a case which comes up for trial before him today. (Thursday). The man who discovered the island, unless the vague accounts of seventeenth century discovery by a French navigator are allowed, will be the court as the plaintiff in the case. The suit is that of Pemien against the Oceanic Photo-graph company. The plaintiff, Captain Pemien, claims that while cruising in the Celtic Chasing in the 70s in the

region of Clipperton found his discovery. When he returned to San Francisco he requested his discovery to the state department under the provisions of the federal statute and claimed the right in the dispute of states on the island. He was induced to transfer his claim to the island and the dispute to a corporation which was formed for that purpose, the Oceanic Photo-graph company, one of the defendants in this suit. This was done and now Pemien is the owner of the stock in claim for these persons. The state department has been communicated with and the decision rendered in this case may settle the question of which national flag is entitled to fly over this small but commercially valuable life.

## A Klondike Ship Speculation.
