

## CUTTING SCRAPE IN COTTONWOOD.

Richard Maxfield Abuses Neri  
Butler and is Stabbed in  
The Back.

BOTH MEN HAD BEEN DRINKING.

Trouble Arose Over the Jumping of  
Certain Land in Big Cotton-  
wood Canyon.

There was a cutting scrape at Big Cottonwood about 6 o'clock last evening in which Richard Maxfield, proprietor of Maxfield's summer resort, located just above the stairs in the canyon, was stabbed in the back by Neri Butler, who resides about a half mile west of the lower power house. Maxfield was taken to Murray and placed in Dr. Jones' hospital for treatment and Butler was brought to this city by Deputy Sheriff's Sharp, Steele and Edwards, and placed in the county jail. He will probably be charged with assault with a deadly weapon with intent to do bodily harm.

It seems from the statements made by both men that the trouble arose over Maxfield's land in the canyon being claimed by Bishop Britton. Maxfield had been away on a prospecting trip and in his absence his resort was jumped. He had some trouble over the land with Bishop Britton at Sandy yesterday morning and had decided to fight the case in court. In the afternoon he started up the canyon to his home. He had been drinking and had a bottle of whiskey with him. When he arrived at Mr. Butler's home he stopped and invited Butler out to have a drink. After drinking together Maxfield wanted to know why Butler did not let him know about Britton jumping his land. To this Butler replied that he did not know the land had been jumped and didn't know where Maxfield's family was.

**STABBING OFFENSE.**  
Maxfield called Butler a liar and commenced abusing him and finally told him to get his knife out and come on. He rushed at Butler and the latter drew a large pocket knife and stabbed Maxfield in the back just under the left kidney. Maxfield then commenced throwing rocks at Butler and chased him in the house. After trying to get the man to come out the house and he refused to do so, Maxfield went up to the power house and the men there called up Dr. Bird of Murray and also called the sheriff's office.

**MEN TAKEN IN CHARGE.**  
Deputy Sheriff's Sharp, Steele and Edwards went out and brought the wounded man to Murray to the hospital and brought Butler to jail. They secured the knife with which Maxfield was stabbed and also the latter's knife, which was unopened when it was found.

**MAXFIELD IMPROVING.**  
Inquiry was made at the hospital today as to Maxfield's condition and it was stated that he is improving. Dr. Bird does not think that the knife penetrated the kidney so the wound is not very serious. Maxfield is 48 years of age and Butler about 37. Up to this time they had been close friends for years.

Prisoner at City Jail Makes Desperate Effort to Commit Suicide.

About midnight last night Officer Carlson arrested and took to the police station a young fellow named Tryon, against whom a charge of vagrancy had been lodged a week ago. Tryon had been sentenced to the city jail, under the promise that he would work at the Utah park, and to get or failed to keep his promise of seeking other duties. He felt very badly, and in a sudden fit of despair, he tried to commit suicide. He was found by a medic and after smothering it, tried to sever an artery in his wrist. He was detected in the act, and the wrist was bandaged by John Kimball, who placed the prisoner in a cell. He could get hold of nothing of a dangerous character. The desperate man then banded his head against the wall, taking off a large piece of the wall. Seeing that he was determined to take his life if possible, the officer smashed his hands behind him, and placed him in a padded cell. He became quiet and settled down to rest. This morning it developed that he had secured employment at the Utah park, and today he was released from jail and allowed to go on his way rejoicing.

## FATAL ACCIDENT AT BEAVER CITY.

Moses Wilson Comes in Contact With Deadly Current While Inspecting Power Plant.

## SHOCK KILLED HIM INSTANTLY.

Occurred During Visit of B. Y. University Students to Electric Light Works.

(Special to the "News.")

Beaver, Utah, May 8.—A most deplorable accident occurred here last evening, resulting in the death of young Moses Wilson. About 7 o'clock Prof. Andrew B. Anderson, principal of the Beaver branch of the B. Y. university, invited the members of his class in physical science to accompany him on a visit of inspection to the power house of the electric light company. Many accepted the invitation, and a pleasant evening was anticipated. The students were all advised against meddling with or touching anything connected with the institution. Notwithstanding the warning, young Wilson put his hand upon one of the motors and received a shock that killed him instantly.

The deceased was 21 years of age, and a son of Mr. and Mrs. D. I. Wilson, of Hillsdale, Garfield county, whether the body will be taken for burial. The terrible affair has cast a deep gloom over the entire community, and especially is the sad event deplored by the fellow students of the unfortunate boy, as he was a general favorite among them.
