

STANDARD COUNSEL TALKS OF DECISION

He Says That the Decree Does
Not Order a Dissolution of
The Oil Company.

AN APPEAL WILL BE TAKEN

Verdict of Highest Court in the Land
Will be Cheerfully
Abided By.

New York, Nov. 21.—Mortimer F. Elliott, general counsel for the Standard Oil company, said today in commenting for the first time on the decision against the company handed down yesterday by the United States circuit court at St. Paul:

"I have seen what purports to be the text of the decree handed down by the United States circuit court yesterday. The company will take an appeal immediately to the United States supreme court, and will cheerfully abide by the verdict of the highest court in the land, whatever that may be.

"Arguments in this case began last April, and we are glad to have reached an opinion. I do not mean we are pleased with the opinion itself, but we are glad to get it, whatever its nature.

"The decree does not order a dissolution of the Standard Oil company; that is a misunderstanding. What the decree orders, as I now understand it, is that the company shall distribute among its stockholders, of whom there are approximately 5,000, its holdings of stock of subsidiary companies. This distribution, I further understand, is ordered to be effected on a pro rata basis of apportionment. That is to say, heaviest holders of Standard Oil stock would receive a proportional number of shares in the stock of subsidiary companies."

Mr. Elliott was asked what course the company would adopt if the verdict of the lower court should be upheld in the higher court.

"That," he said, "is something I shall

be better prepared to discuss when I have seen the opinion by which the United States circuit court justifies its decree."

Henry Wellman, who represented the attorney general of Missouri in that

state's suit against the Standard Oil company, and conducted the examination in New York of the officers of the company, takes a view similar to that expressed by Mr. Elliott. He sums up the situation as "a theoretical victory."

"I cannot see," he said, "that any practical effect is to be expected. It seems as if the best the government can do is to order the sale of the property and, in that case, the money, of course, goes to the present stockholders in some form or other. There is no confiscation, no punishment, as there would be in the case of criminal proceedings with the imposition of a fine."

"The case is similar to that of the coal roads, which were forced to separate from their coal business and it is difficult to say even if the decision is upheld by the supreme court, how the government can prevent the control of Standard Oil properties remaining in the same hands, even if it is split up into its constituent properties. This has been the case in every suit in the dissolution of combinations. They have simply been put into different shape and have gone along more compactly."

ROCKEFELLER SAYS HE
SIMPLY CANNOT TALK

Cleveland, Ohio, Nov. 21.—"I cannot comment on the decision of the United States circuit court on the government's complaint" against the Standard Oil company, John D. Rockefeller said at church today.

"I am no longer actively connected with the management of the company, and it would be improper for me to enter into a discussion of the matter."

Mr. Rockefeller, who has been ill, is recovering rapidly.

ATTEMPT TO POISON
AUSTRIAN OFFICERS

Vienna, Nov. 21.—An extraordinary attempt at wholesale poisoning among military officers here has caused a sensation.

A large number of officers just promoted to be captains on the general staff have received through the mails sample boxes of pills. These were accompanied by a circular recommending them for nervous debility. Capt. Mader took some of the pills and died almost immediately. An autopsy revealed the presence of cyanide of potassium.

A further investigation showed that all the pills contained cyanide of potassium in large quantities and also that many first lieutenants attached to the staff, but not promoted, had not received theirs. The circular were signed "Charles Francis" and bore a false address.

It is suggested that the poison may have been sent out by some disappointed officer or that the poisoning is an anarchist outrage.

GOVERNMENT GETS
SOME EXPERIENCE

Washington, Nov. 21.—Although the first appropriation for the so-called Emery 12-inch elevating carriage for the ordnance equipment of the army was made in 1892, the board of ordnance and fortification in its annual report, made public today, says:

"So far the government has nothing to show for its expenditure except the foundations for the carriage."

Additional appropriations have been made since 1892, of which \$4,511 has been paid the constructor, A. H. Emery.

THREE KILLED, TWO
HURT IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Cuthbert, Ga., Nov. 21.—Three persons are dead and two probably fatally injured as a result of an automobile accident here late tonight. The dead are Curtis Williams, James Shepard and Horace Shivers. The injured are Miss Helene Mattox and Miss Mary Mattox.

With the purpose of being married, James Shepard and Miss Helene Mattox, 18 years old, accompanied by Horace Shepard, a brother of the bridegroom, and Miss Mary Mattox, aged 16, a sister of the bride-to-be, obtained an automobile at Fort Gaines late this afternoon, and were quickly driven to Cuthbert by Curtis Williams.

UNITED KINGDOM
ABSORBED IN POLITICS

London, Nov. 21.—The United Kingdom is more absorbed in politics now than for many years, and the coming week will see the culmination of the fierce war over the budget. The house of lords is expected to vote Thursday on Lord Lansdowne's resolution calling for the rejection of the budget.

Most leaders in the house will speak. Lord Rosebery's effort for the Conservatives and that of the Earl of Halsbury for the Liberals are awaited with the most interest. Probably the largest number of lords was mustered for the vote since the rejection of home rule. About 450 are likely to be assembled, and not more than one-quarter of these will support the budget.

Most of the politicians predict that when the question goes before the people at the general elections in January, it will be impossible to wipe out the great Liberal majority and that the Liberal government will be returned, but with a comparatively small majority. The betting at Lloyd's is 3 to 1 in favor of the Liberals. Liberal leaders declare that the issue is whether the hereditary chamber shall rule the country.

TRAVELERS' PROTECTIVE
ASSOCIATION SHORTAGE

St. Louis, Nov. 21.—Louis T. Labesum, national secretary and treasurer of the Travelers' Protective Association of America, resigned. A shortage of at least \$7,000, it was announced, exists in books of the order.

Directors, in accepting Labesum's resignation, give him a vote of confidence and he will continue with the organization in a minor capacity.

Labesum in a statement issued tonight said the records of William Henschen, head bookkeeper, who committed suicide July 7, show a shortage, but auditors have not been able to show the exact amount.

New York, Nov. 22.—Leaders among wage-earners and employers throughout the country were in attendance today at the meeting of the National Civic Federation. The call for the conference announced that among the problems to be discussed were:

Compensation for victims of industrial accidents; employers' voluntary sick and death funds; and retirement funds for old age pensions.

The governors of nearly every state appointed a representative to attend today's gathering.
