## LIGHT SHED ON **BOULDER'S WORK**

"Pecular" Methods Are Shown In Interesting Letter to Coach Maddock.

CONDITIONS AS THEY ARE

Manager of Colorado Aggies Has Something to Say About Dictatorial Colorado School as to Athletics.

Utah athletes and devotees of athletic games, especially football, will be interested in reading part of a letter received by Coach Joe Maddock of the U. of U. from Frank J. Earle, graduate manager of athletics of the Colorado Agricultural college. The position of the Colorado schools with reference to our University is touched upon by Mr. garle, who is friendly to the Utah institution. Here is part of the letter sent to Mr. Maddock:
"I imagine that you have concluded

from my silence that I have registered the customary Colorado feeling against Utah people. I have not, but what I say is solely from my personal stand-point and is not sanctioned by my board. The only phase of relationship that exists between Rocky mountain that exists between Rocky mountain teams is that they are coached by middle west stars. There is not in the Rocky mountain region the slightest claim of fair and impartial relationships, I want to say that the organization which exists between Colorato colleges is faretal, and that each acts independently as if they belonged to an outside conference and played the others simply to fill their schedule. It certainly permits the most flagrant despotle attitude, and keeps up a continual besimiching howl between the members.

"What is the moral difference in the constitutionality of the Denver football team, with its sensational rise to fame, and of the University of Colorado? The latter is in bitter warfare, assuming the attitude, 'I am holier than thou.' The state university claims a clean slate on the grounds that they are living up to present called rigid athletic control. They claim that Denver, the past year, had nothing more or less than a professional team. From what I know of the merits of the case, with facts on both sides, Denver has not violated thietic chies to any greater extent morally than Colorado is doing at the present time, and always has done. What I want to impress is, does Colorado's apparent adherence to the general athletic control give them a spotless character?

"The present eligibility 'cloak' is the product of the Boulder institution. I charge that the 'cloak' was admirably made for Boulder, and give her the credit for the clever foresight which she had a putting herself in such a clever advantage through such framed-up regulations. While Boulder lives up to the letter of her own manufactured code, she is doubtless violating athletic ethics that would send her from such a conference as the 'Big Nine,' in shame. Utah's standing has given me less concern than has that of nearer neighbors. Utah does not need sense any sin until someone else casts the first stone. All efforts for a strong league in the past have failed. I am led to think that present policies are to be the rule until we can all be, as independent as Denver has shown herself to be, I look for no 'get together' as long as one strong school stands in a dictatorial position. I have not received a copy of the Utah eligibility rules which you promised me. Now that you have adopted the Colorado code, will you be any better respected? Yes, so far as living up to them is concerned. This, however, does not assure everything on the 'square.' I maintain that it does not, and base my assertions from experiences here at home. Not that the code is faulty, but that it reaches far enough to regulate you and me to the disadvantage of the other fellow.

Sixteen Teams of American and Foreign Cyclists Start On Long Grind in New York.

New York, Dec. 7.—Amid the plaudits of 10,000 spectators, Dorando Peitri, the Marathon runner, at 12:03:45 o'clock this (Monday) morning, fired the signal this (Monday) morning, fired the signal that sent 16 teams of American and foreign bleyelists away in the sixteenth annual six-day race around the dig saucer-shaped board track in Madison Square Garden. Many of the riders who in past years have participated in the event again faced the starter, notably Rutt and Stol, who captured the big end of the prize last winter, Matt Downey and Patsy Logan, Boboy Walthour and Eddie Root, Froyd McFurland and Jimmie Moran, and Leon Georget and Victor Dupre, the Frenchimen who made such a game finish last year; but there also were esveral competitors new to American bleyele entinusasts. Among the new comers are Brocco and Labrousse and Faber and La Fourade.

The race, by reason of changes in the rules, probably will be the hardest fought contest since Miller and Waller, in 1899, set the record for six days at 2,733 miles 4 laps.

The race will be a constant grind, with no let-ups for sprint and motor-paced races, and every rider at all times must protect himself from being lapped, Everything will count, and the rider who goes down will lose the distance the other contestants gain over him. The men got off to a rolling start, the first two laps not counting. No advantage could be gained during the first mile, They were all weil bunched, with Eddie Root making the pace. Logan led at the end of the first mile, with the others close up. Time—227.

The first fall of the race occurred during the runing of the tenth mile, While climbing the embankment on the Madison avenue side of the track, the handle bar of "Peddlar" Palmer's wheel twisted, and rider and wheel slid down amid a mild cheer from the crowd. He was unhurt and resumed riding.

The pace set from the start was fast, and at the end of the first hour a new record had been hung up of 25 miles 5 laps. The previous record for the first hour was 25 miles 2 laps, made by Gougoutz and Kazer in 1903.
