

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**Potato Crop.**—The potato crop is being gathered. It is above the average yield.

**Sunday School Notice.**—The time and place of holding the next regular meeting of the Deseret Sunday School Union will be made known as soon as ascertained.

**Funeral at Eleven O'clock.**—The funeral of the late James Pitt, announced to take place to-morrow morning, at 10 o'clock, will be held at 11 o'clock, instead. The change was made at the suggestion of Bishop John Sharp, superintendent of the railroad, who desires all the railroad employees to be in attendance at the funeral, which their duties would prevent at an earlier hour than the last named.

**Museum.**—Several numbers of the *Utah Pioneer*, published in this city in 1874, have been presented to the Museum Library by the editor of that journal, P. O. Thomassen, numbers 13 and 16, with a few of the last numbers after No. 30, wanting to complete the file, which the editor will be glad to receive. Another Levi W. Richards has contributed a piece of Plymouth ware, formerly belonging to the late Levi Richards, of this city.

**Old Curiosity Shop.**—A good audience witnessed the production of the charming dramatization of the life of the late Levi Richards, which was presented by the audience generally. Miss Putnam, who furthered the production of the play, is an actress in sustaining the role of "Little Nell" and the "Marchioness." The other characters were well played also, especially being especially liked. The play was not brought off sufficiently strong. The performance as a whole, however, was good, and well merited a better audience and the generous applause accorded. To-night "Fanchon the Cricket" is to be presented, with Miss Putnam in the leading role, supported by the Hazenwinkle Comedians.

**The County Convention.**—The County Convention assembled at the Court House in this city, as per appointment, at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Judge Z. Snow was elected temporary chairman; Seymour R. Young, Secretary; A. H. Raleigh, chaplain, and John V. Smith, sergeant-at-arms. The chairman, after stating the object of the meeting, called upon the chaplain, who opened in prayer. The Secretary then read the call for the convention, published heretofore. On motion, a committee of five was appointed to examine credentials, viz.: A. H. Raleigh, Joseph E. Taylor, Joseph S. Rawlings, James Crane, Wm. McLaughlin. The committee retired.

At this juncture, Judge Snow being summoned away on a subpoena to the District Court as a witness, on motion he was excused from acting as chairman, and Aurelius Mier was elected to preside in his stead. During the absence of the committee on credentials, the Convention was addressed by the chairman, but he did not come from the 1st city precinct, three from the 5th city precinct, one from Big Cottonwood, one from Mountain Dell and Sugar House, one from Little Cottonwood, one from Granite, two from Draper, one from Bingham. On motion the temporary organization was made permanent, and a committee of nine was appointed to nominate delegates to the Territorial Convention.

Following is the committee so appointed: J. S. Rawlings, R. T. Burton, Joseph E. Taylor, James Crane, Emeline B. Wells, George B. Bailey, Henry Beckstead, R. V. Morris, Samuel Bennion.

While this committee retired to consult, the meeting was addressed by Messrs. A. M. Musser and A. H. Raleigh.

The committee on nominations returned the following names as delegates to the Territorial Convention: Chas. W. Penrose, Thomas Taylor, W. H. Hooper, James Starn, John R. Winder, Reuben Miller, Joseph S. Rawlings, Robert Pickett, Isaac M. Stewart, John Gabbott, Elizabeth Howard, Emeline B. Wells, Archibald Gardner, Joseph E. Taylor, Nicholas Greenstock and Adam Spies. Each name was presented singly and voted for unanimously.

To provide against vacancies occurring in the ranks of the above delegates, on motion four alternate delegates were appointed as follows: A. Mier, R. V. Morris, John Henry Smith and R. T. Burton.

**Priesthood Meeting.**—The regular monthly meeting of the priesthood of the Salt Lake Stake of Zion, was held in the Assembly Hall this morning at 11 o'clock, President A. M. Cannon and Counselors presiding. Present also, President John Taylor, Apostles Orson Pratt, W. D. Richards, Geo. Q. Cannon and Jos. E. Smith, Presiding Bishop Edward Hunter, President J. D. T. McAllister, of St. George, and others. After singing, Bishop E. D. Woolley delivered the opening prayer. The roll of wards was called, each one being represented by some of its presiding authorities excepting the 15th, 19th, 20th, 21st and Draperville wards. The statistical report of the Stake was read, showing a net increase of 180 souls during the last quarter. The report of the Jubilee Fund was also read, showing the amounts contributed by the various wards of the Stake for distribution among the worthy poor, and also the various amounts recommended for distribution among the several wards. The total of means contributed is \$5,069.34; the total of amounts recommended for distribution, \$4,074.93. The difference recommended is \$1,094.41. The reports in detail will probably be published in due time. The business of the meeting being dispatched, President John Taylor arose to speak. He explained some matters in connection with the Territorial Jubilee Fund, and announced that in all probability a full report would be submitted at the coming conference. He then spoke of the building of the Assembly Hall. Its total cost was \$30,000; \$20,000 of which had been donated by the 35 wards of the Stake, the remainder by the Trustees-in-Trust. There was yet owing on the building \$4,500 in cash and \$1,000 in orders on the Trustees-in-Trust. The building of the Temple was also mentioned, and the Bishops and all interested urged to be alive to the importance of going ahead with the enterprise and the various Stakes of this Temple district were urged to bring forward their donations to assist in the work. He closed by expressing an earnest desire for the welfare of Israel.

President A. M. Cannon also remarked upon the matter of the Assembly Hall, and was followed by Apostle George Q. Cannon on the same subject. He spoke of the indebtedness yet hanging over the building and the necessity of its being liquidated. He thought the Stake, for whose especial accommodation the house was erected, should pay off this debt and not depend upon the general Church. He suggested that each member of the Stake deriving income, assess himself one day's wages or income to be devoted to the paying off of the debt.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the suggestion be adopted by the meeting and that each Bishop present the subject to his ward and report the result to the presidency of the Stake. A notice was read from Bishop Hunter requesting each Bishop to send to his office a list of persons who had donated to the Temple during the year 1879, together with the amounts so donated.

The Doxology was sung and the meeting adjourned until the first Saturday in November. Benediction by Apostle Joseph F. Smith.

**"Leader" Locals.**—From the Logan Leader of yesterday we take the following items: There came near being a fire at Orin's drug store on Monday last. The clerk, Cyrus Napper, was evaporating, by means of an alcohol lamp, some syrup of squills to the proper consistency, when a boy in the store accidentally struck his foot against the vessel containing the preparation, upsetting both it and the lamp. Instantly a blaze leaped up to the height of several feet, and the store and contents were in imminent danger for a few moments, as there were several gallons of inflammable liquids in vessels near the spot. Luckily, no serious damage resulted.

A short time since a young lady in this city had occasion to go up stairs and into her room during the middle of the day when she witnessed a curious phenomenon. No person had been in the room for hours, so far as was known, and she entered, she happened to glance at a work basket which stood on a table in one corner of the room, and which contained sewing material, ribbons, etc. Smoke was issuing from this basket, and as the young lady approached it, she lifted a handful of its contents and discovered some matches in it that were burning and smoking. She was so startled by the discovery that she immediately rushed out of the room, and on her return she found the basket empty. The discovery was most providential, as the entire contents of the basket would not doubt have been in a blaze in a moment, and this fire set fire to the building. Spontaneous combustion is the only theory that will account for the burning of the matches, and doubtless many mysterious fires have been caused by the same means.

On Saturday evening, the 18th inst., the stockholders of the co-operative lumber, shingle and lath mills of Smithfield held a meeting, at which it was agreed that the above named property should be turned into the United Order, the stockholders agreeing to stock in the latter. The property is situated on the border of the former. Thus the lumber interests of Smithfield are to be henceforth under one management with the tannery and the boot, shoe and harness shop, which is about to be established. A plan is now about to be added to the property thus turned over, and the United Order also purpose erecting a blacksmith and machine shop as another branch of home industry. Smithfield is certainly looking up. It seems as if the whole town is being renovated, and the enterprises lately started there, together with those in contemplation, will have a strong tendency to build up the town and provide employment and support for those of the inhabitants who are not farmers. It is but just to award much of the credit for all this to Bishop Farrell's activity, energy and enterprise, and his sincere trust that, under his wise direction, the people of Smithfield will have all their prospects of prosperity fully realized.

**Sunday Services.**—The Sunday services of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, will consist of the following: Sabbath School at 10 a.m.; general meeting in the tabernacle at 2 p.m.; and ward meetings as usual at night. Home missionaries will visit the country ward during the day.

**Boreman, the Dissenter.**—Judge Boreman treated his last as an Associate Justice of this Territory, yesterday. We bid him a hearty good bye. Whatever may be said against him, we will say this much in his behalf—he has ever been consistent—to himself. As a pious member of the Methodist Church and a bitter enemy to the "people of Utah," his career in this Territory, from first to last, has been the same. We have never known him to give a decision from the bench favorable to the "Mormons," when he could possibly get out of it, and we have never known him to miss a Methodist Conference, even if held at the North Pole, if he could by any means manage to slip away from his work long enough to be there. True, both the "Mormons" and the United States Government have had to stand the trouble and expense of these little capers, but the Judge no doubt "dissented" from their views, has a clear conscience, or thinks he has, and all else must fall to the ground.
