Indefiniteness of Accuser's Statements Construed to be in Commissioner's Favor.

The state board of examiners, acting upon the findings of Stanley Hanks, who was appointed to investigate the charges of grafting brought against John Peterson, state food and dairy commissioner, has decided that the charges were not proven nor substan tlated. The report of Mr. Hanks was submitted to the governor Tuesday and was at once considered by the board of examiners. The report of Mr. Hanks was as follows:

The Honorable Board of Examiners-Contlement I beg leave to report that by receast of the governor, and under the authorization of the board of ex-aminers. I have examined the verbal and written charges made by Walter J. Frazier against John Peterson, state tood and dairy commissioner.

FRAZIER'S CHARGES.

Mr. Pagier charges in effect that on r about May 5, 1997, he and Mr. Air, Fagier charges in effect that on or about May 5, 1997, he and Mr. Peterson visited bix candy companies and distributers of candies in Salt Lake to make an inspection; that at each of these places Mr. Peterson se-cured several samples of candy and confectionery for testing purposes; further, that Mr. Peterson presented and the the company for the start of rach further, that Mr. Peterson presented and had the person in charge of cach place sign a blank receipt; that no money was paid to either of these par-lics for the sample. In the presence of Mr. Frazier, and that in several cuzes the amounts afterward inserted in several of the receipts exceeded the price of the samples. Further, that upon a second visit

Further, that upon a second visit which he and Mr. Peterson made to the Startup Candy company, on request the Startup Candy company, on request of the governor, to ascertain whether or not Mr. Peterson had paid for the samples he had previously secured. Mr. Peterson acknowledged his mis-take in paying the Sparks Candy com-rany for samples at such a late date and entreated him at length to husa the matter up. In a second written statement, referring to the same inci-cent, Mr. Frazier makes a contradi-tory charge that the second visit above referred to the Sparks Candy company and that upon coming out Mr. Peter-son acknowledged his mistake, etc. PETERSON'S STATEMENT.

In answer to these charges Mr Peterson makes, in effect, the follow-ing statement: That at the time he se-cured the samples he made out the receipts in full and had them signed by the parties concerned; he admits that he did not pay for them at the time, not having the money with him, and considering it an extension of credit to him from the firm furnishing the samples; but at states to the best on his recollection the price of the sam ples was settled upon at the time here.
