It is a mat-ter of pride to say, and to be able to say it with impartiality-that the honors of the evening were carried off again by the chorus. This selection, the one

This selection, the one with which the tabernacle choir won its \$1,000 dollar prize in the famous competition at Chicago in 1893, aroused a host of memories in the audience and its reception was almost equal to that accorded the "Hallelujah." A special word of praise ought to be said for the male volces, which did noble work, es-pecially in the "Hallelujah" chorus, where their "King of Kings" unison passage was most effective. Prof Me-Ciellan's organ work was superb from reproduction with delight. It was very effectively given. The orchestra acquitted itself with marked credit in the "Tamhauser" overture and the andante and march from the "Leonore Symphony" of Raft; but in the "Tonbilder" from "Die Walkeure" the acoustic properties of the auditorium were not accurately gaged, and the brasses smothered the strings in the "Fire" music. Concert Meister Foerstel's violin solo was a beautiful piece of work, rich and clear in tone, perfect in execution. Mine, De Sellem's contraito aria from the "Queen of Sacha" was a fine effort. Lomax Says it Does Not Increase Business for Nebraska Roads.

iness for Nebraska Roads. Omaha, April 10.—E. L. Lomax, gen-eral passenger agent of the Union Pa-cific, said today: "The reports that have been sent out from Omaha that the recently-enacted law establishing a 2-cent per mile passenger rate in Ne-braska has had the effect of increasing the business of the Nebraska rallroads are erroneous. While the passenger earnings of the Union Pacific show a normal increase, this is due to lower earnings of the Union Pacific show a normal increase, this is due to lower interstate rates to the Pacific coast and intermediate points, made for the pur-pose of inducing colonization. These rates took effect March I, about the same time as the 2-cent rate, and are effective until April 30. It will be some time before it will be possible to gage the effect of the Nebraska 2-cent pas-senger rate." senger rate.
