Secretary Loeb Says President Refused to Mix With Jenkins Contest.

LOCAL POLITICS ARE IGNORED

When Those With Petty Grievances Called on Chief Executive He Was "Not at Home."

Chippewa Falls, Wis., Sept. 8 .-- Judge ohn J. Jenkins, congressman from the Eleventh Wisconsin district, today received a letter from William Loeb, Jr., secretary to President Roosevelt, in which Secretary Loeb asserts that statements made in a circular purported to have been issued by Judge Smith of the Superior, on the eve of the recent Wisconsin primary election, are false. It is alleged by Judge Jenkins' friends It is alleged by Judge Jenkins Friends that the circular in question brought about the defeat of Jenkins by Irvin L. Lenroot for the Republican con-gressional nomination. The leter is dated Oyster Bay, Sept. 4, and reads: "My Dear Judge Jenkins: I am in re-ceich for nom letters of the 2d with in

"My Dear Judge Jenkins: I am in re-ceipt of your letter of the 2d, with in-ciousure. The statements which the circular says were made by the presi-dent, or his secretary, are absolutely false. Judge Smith called at the ex-ecutive office and asked to see the **president**. He was told by Acting Secy. "Joster that the president would not see him or any one else on a mat-ter of local political nature and would not discuss it any way.

"Judge Smith then wrote a note to the president asking him to say wheth-er or pot the claim of Representative Jenkins that the president had written him a letter urging his re-nomina

Jenkins that the president had writ-ten him a letter urging his re-nomina-tion was true. "Judge Smith was again told that the president declined to say anything whatever about the matter or to dis-cuse it in any way. "Mr. Forster told Judge Smith that a great many appeals to interfere with political protests were sent to the president, but that the president has invariably refused to take part in any of them. Mr. Forster never made the statement that the president had been 'presistently importuned by Mr. Jenk-ins and his friends to dorse Mr Jenkins' candidacy." "This was no denial of any claims. Aug. 20. Capt. Moore's last duty was as judge advocate in the department of Minda-nao, in the Philippines, where he be-came ill. He came home by way of Europe. He was on the way from New York to join his reiment at Fort Douglas, Utah, when he stopped here

SENSATIONAL TESTIMONY.

Woman Tells How Rustin and She

Were to Die at Her Hands.

Omaha. Sept. 8.—The coroner's in-quest into the death of Dr. Frederick Rustin, whose tragic death at the door of him home in this city has given the rdistin, whose tragic death at the door of him home in this city has given the police department a puzzling oroblem, developed several sensations today. The first was the testimony of Mrs. Abbie Rice, the woman who was last known to be in Rustin's company on the night of his death. She declared that for some time Dr. Rustin had been talking of committing suickle, but that he wished to disguise the act so as to protect his life insurance for the bene-fit of his family. After much impor-tunity he induced her to promise to kill him and then take her own life. Arrangements for this were made for Friday night, Aug. 28, but her nerve falled her. On Huesday night follow-ing Dr. Rustin pointed out to her on the street car a man who, he sald, had promised to do the deed, saying that it would be done that night. Later she identified Charles E. Davis, a clerk in a local bank and a member
