Killed to Death.

LOWELL, Mass., 13.—Mrs. Dunn, the wife of this city, was killed to death this p.m. by her husband, who wanted money from her, but was refused; Dunn is under arrest.

PITTSBURG, 13.—A fire this a.m. at Monongahela City, Pa., destroyed the saw mills belonging to Culbertson, the planing mill of Foster & Co., and two other dwellings, loss \$50,000, insurance \$17,000.

WESTERN.

News From the Navigator Islands.

SAN FRANCISCO, 13.—A Bulletin letter from the Navigator Islands says that Colonel Steinberger, U. S. Commissioner, was cordially received by the natives who adopted a constitution framed by Steinberger, making him governor for a term of four years to alternate between the two old families of kings, Mail-lon and Topua; a representative of the former family was elected the first king. Colonel Steinberger was chosen prime minister for life, and accepted the position.

FOREIGN.

Speech by the Canadian Premier.

LONDON, 13.—Mackenzie, the Canadian Premier, in a speech at Dundee last night, referred to the great resources of Canada. He pointed out that it was quite consistent for two nations to exist on the North American continent, governed differently and with different political institutions, and he was convinced that so long as Great Britain maintained her present attitude towards the colonies friendship and confidence would be maintained.

The Moody and Sankey Meetings.

The following is the summary of meetings held by Moody and Sankey in London during the past four months, with their aggregate attendance: Canterbury, 45,000 people; Victoria Theatre, 45 meetings, attended by 40,000; in the Opera House, 60 meetings, attended by 350,000; in Bow, 60 meetings, attended by 90,000; in the Agricultural Hall, 60 meetings, attended by 750,000. The amount of money expended for building, printing, and other expenses, was \$140,000. Moody and Sankey decline to receive any compensation from the committee.

The Grain Market.

The *Miner's Exchange*, in its weekly review, says the crops have been progressing favorably and reports to this effect have produced a quiet feeling in the London market, where prices had begun to advance, but there has been a further improvement in country prices, there being in many places an advance of one to two shillings for wheat, and as the idea of having a crop equal to last year's is given up and stocks decrease, there is plenty of room for a further rise. In France the damage to crops from floods has been very extensive in the provinces, and figures show a rise in wheat from one to two shillings.

Cup to be Shot For.

The Council of the British National Rifle Association, at a meeting to-day, adopted a resolution that the New York Rifle Association be invited to accept a challenge cup, to be competed for in 1875, at Wimbledon, by the Americans, the winner to hold the cup until the next meeting of the New York Association, when he is to hand it over to the council of that Association, in order that it may be competed for then, and annually thereafter, at a range of 1,000 yards, on conditions to be determined by the New York Association.

Feeding the Americans.

EDINBURGH, 13.—The American team and their supporters will be fed and entertained to-day by William Nelson, a leading citizen of Edinburgh, gave them a banquet to-night, in the course of which he made a speech, in which he lauded America. Gladders responded in fitting terms. The members of the team leave for London to-morrow.

FRANCE.

Election Announced by Kest.

VERSAILLES, 12.—The Assembly, to-day, declared the election of M. Baringue, in the Department of Nièvre, null and void, by a vote of 330 yeas to 215 nays. The ministers were questioned in regard to their conduct towards the Bonapartists when M. Rouher made his expected speech.
